Born in a small town in South Georgia, Nikki DeLoach always knew she wanted to be an entertainer. She started dancing at the age of three, eventually adding singing, modeling and acting to her repertoire. All her hard work paid off when at age 12, DeLoach became a member of The Mickey Mouse Club, alongside Justin Timberlake, Britney Spears, Christina Aguilera and Ryan Gosling. After "MMC," DeLoach spent several years in Los Angeles pursuing acting and landed a starring role opposite Mark Wahlberg and Bill Paxton in the feature film Traveller, and the TV series Misery Loves Company. She also played Anthony LaPaglia's daughter in the television movie Never Give Up: The Jimmy V Story. In 1997, DeLoach put her acting career on hold to enter the world of pop music, signing with RCA and BMG Records to become part of the girl group Innosense. When the group disbanded in 2003, DeLoach returned to Hollywood and has gone on to enjoy a successful and diverse acting career.

DeLoach's recent credits include her starring role on MTV's critically acclaimed series, *Awkward*, where she was considered one of television's "hottest moms" with her portrayal of Lacey Hamilton. Although she is perhaps best known for her roles on *Awkward* and the iconic *The Mickey Mouse Club*, DeLoach has also been guest starring on some of TV's biggest hit shows, including *NCIS*, *Criminal Minds*, *CSI*, *CSI*: *NY*, *Cold Case*, *Mad Men* and *Without a Trace*, among many others. She was also a series regular on the popular show *North Shore*. Her films include *Love & Other Drugs*, *Flying Lessons*, opposite Maggie Grace and Hal Holbrook, and the French comedy *Hollywoo*. Hallmark Channel viewers will also recognize DeLoach from her starring roles in the network's original movies *The Perfect Catch*, *Christmas Land*, *A Dream of Christmas*, *Truly*, *Madly*, *Sweetly*, and *Love Takes Flight*, which premiered as a Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation. She also developed, executive produced, and starred in *Reunited at Christmas* and returned to the network in the 2019 Christmas movie *Two Turtle Doves*, opposite Michael Rady.

Outside of acting, DeLoach is dedicated to sharing her passions and ideas with others. She co-founded What We Are, a community of women that celebrates their unfiltered selves. She is also a passionate supporter and spokesperson for Children's Hospital Los Angeles and The Alzheimer's Association. DeLoach also shares her love for acting by coaching at the renowned Warner Loughlin Studios. She currently resides in Los Angeles with her husband and two young sons, Hudson and Bennett.



Awkward alumna Nikki DeLoach is set as a series regular opposite Jeremy Sisto, Archie Panjabi and Kevin Rankin in ABC's murder trial drama pilot, *The Jury*. Written by VJ Boyd and Mark Bianculli, and executive produced by Carol Mendelsohn, *The Jury* examines "the ultimate social experiment" that happens thousands of times a day in the U.S.: A person's fate is placed in the hands of 12 strangers. Described as "12 Angry Men meets the podcast Serial," the series follows a single murder trial a season as seen through the eyes of the individual jurors, exploring the biases and experiences that influence the jurors' judgment and how their preconceptions change along the way. DeLoach will play Haley, a beautiful, stylish Southern Belle who uses her flirtatious charm to cover the tragedy of her real life, which is spiraling out of control. DeLoach starred as Lacey Hamilton on all five seasons of MTV's Awkward and also appeared on NCIS, Major Crimes, Criminal Minds and Castle, among others. All Nikki DeLoach wanted for Christmas was an *Awkward* reunion, and she got it... a few months early. The actress formerly known as Lacey Hamilton is currently filming opposite her MTV husband Mike Faiola in Hallmark Channel's *Reunited at Christmas*, a considerably more serious holiday movie than you might expect from the feel-good network.

"It's a different kind of Christmas movie than I've ever done," DeLoach tells TVLine. "It's a family that has gone through a divorce, and they're all being brought back together again at Christmas. This is a real ensemble Christmas movie. It's been challenging, but also super rewarding. I think audiences will really connect with and relate to it." As for reuniting with Faiola, she says, "It's been really fun to do something with him again. Sometimes we sit around set and talk about Awkward and how special it was."

But first, you can catch DeLoach in Hallmark's *Truly, Madly, Sweetly*, premiering Saturday at 9/8c. DeLoach stars as Natalie, a baker who has to start from scratch (get it?) when her ex-boyfriend runs off with her cupcake recipes — and uses them to become famous. When Natalie's baking mentor passes away, she finds herself at odds with the mentor's nephew (played by *Arrow*'s Dylan Neal) who believes his aunt's company should be sold rather than saved. "It's a Hallmark movie, so there's a happy ending," DeLoach says. (Spoiler alert?) "But it's all about the fun way we get to the happy ending." (OK, phew.)

In honor of DeLoach and Faiola's on-screen reunion, TVLine invited her to walk down TV memory lane, recalling some of her favorite memories from Awkward, as well as her guest spots on shows like Grey's Anatomy, Mad Men and Castle.

'I Didn't Know If My Son Would Live': Nikki DeLoach on Her Newborn's Risky Open-Heart Surgery





Nikki DeLoach was devastated to learn at five months pregnant that her unborn son, Bennett Christopher Goodell, had multiple heart defects and might not survive. Now the former Awkward star, 38, opens up to PEOPLE about her family's emotional journey to bringing Bennett home:

I was so excited to go to the doctor.

I remember with my first pregnancy how at 5 months they're able to use 3-D technology to let you almost see what your child's face and hands and fingers look like. It was just amazing and I couldn't wait to do it again. But as I lied there watching the technician do a fetal echocardiogram, I noticed she was spending a lot of time on one specific area. My husband [entertainment lawyer Ryan Goodell] saw my face and asked what was wrong. I asked the technician if everything was okay and she said, "You'll have to wait for the doctor." I instantly knew in my heart. I told my husband, "Something's not right. Something's not right ... " He said, "Don't jump to conclusions," but I just knew something was wrong.

Then the doctor came in and gave us the news that our baby had multiple heart defects. I was inconsolable. He had a ventricular septal defect (or VSD), which is a small hole in his heart, his aorta was narrow, his coronary artery would have to be moved, and he had a transposition of his great arteries, which meant the two arteries that go into his heart were going into the wrong chambers.

Even thinking about it now makes me so emotional because you love your kid so much. I already knew what it was to love a child because I already had my son [William, now 4,] and all of a sudden we didn't know if we were going to get to continue on with the pregnancy. I thought I knew what it was like to have my heart broken, but when you get news like that about your child you can literally feel your heart break into two pieces.

The next few months were incredibly difficult as they did test after test. The waiting for the results was awful. And then we'd be told, "The results weren't clear. We need to do another test." And then more waiting. For an entire month we were waiting to find out if our pregnancy was something that we would be able to continue with. I didn't know if my son would live. It was paralyzing.

But there were two things that kept me going: my family and my faith. My son put a smile on my face every day no matter how upset I was and I had faith that everything was going to work out for the highest good of all. I truly believed that.

When you go through something like this, there is an instinct to not say anything and just hide out and isolate yourself. But I had gone through really serious, suicidal postpartum depression after the birth of my first son and I learned that isolating yourself is the last thing you need to do. You need to reach out to others and let them hold you up, let them be an anchor for you when you cant be an anchor for yourself. For me, my anchor became my husband. We have never been closer than after going through this together.

And reaching out to our community was so important. It was through a friend of mine that I was connected with Kelly Zajfen, she's the woman behind the children's clothing line Little
Minis and her daughter had gone through heart surgery. I told Kelly our story and she instantly put us in contact with a whole team of people at Children's Hospital Los Angeles and they immediately made me feel welcome and as though we would be in the best hands possible when the time came.

Bennett was born Sept. 20 — a birthday he shares with Papa, my late grandfather — and the very next day we were in the hospital headed to CHLA in hopes they could save his life. On Sept. 25 Bennet went in to surgery and cardiothoracic surgeon Vaughn Starnes did the impossible by successfully completing procedures that most kids do not survive.





But we weren't out of the woods yet. For two weeks we stayed by Bennett's side as he recovered from surgery. They had to leave his heart open for a few days so I could literally see my son's heart beating outside his chest. They would have to blow him up like a marshmallow as part of the process of keeping him alive.

None of this was easy to watch, and four nights after the surgery I was in a particularly vulnerable state. I was trying not to fall apart but I had reached my breaking point and I couldn't hold the tears back any longer. I've forever grateful to one of the night nurses who just held me as I sobbed. She looked at me and said, "It's going to be okay. Look at me, I do this every day with these kids, he is going to be okay. I promise you." It was such a critical turning point for me because (a) I believed her and (b) I just needed someone to hold me and tell me that. I couldn't have gone through what I did without every single nurse that helped us. I'm still very emotional but I feel so blessed because not all families come out of a situation like this with such great results.

Bennet may have to have another heart surgery in the future, but for now he's doing great and I'm so grateful because there has been a miracle bestowed on my whole family and I'll never forget that.

People keep asking, "How are you?" And, honestly, I'm in that place where I am still trying to process everything that happened. We brought Bennett home and the first week was really tough because every time he breathed weird or felt warm or sneezed, I panicked. Had he been just a regular kid I would have said it was normal newborn behavior, but because of the heart defect and insane surgery I really struggled through all of that. I think that's perfectly normal. I want mommies to know it's perfectly normal to have PTSD after going through something like we did. I think I'll be dealing with that for a while as I learn what it's like to raise a kid who was born with special circumstances. I'm sure he'll be saying, "Mom, leave me alone." I'm gonna be that helicopter parent constantly, "Are you okay?"

But now — except for what we call his Brave Bennet Scar, the scar on his chest from the surgery — you would just think he's a normal newborn doing all the normal newborn behavior. When he spits up on himself or on me or poops through his diaper or waking up every hour in the middle of the night, I'm actually excited. My nipples are going to fall off but I'm elated. He's holding his head up, he's smiling ... people say that's just gas but I don't care, I tell myself he's smiling at me.

Awkward's Nikki DeLoach Is Pregnant!



Things got adorably awkward between Nikki DeLoach and her The Perfect Catch costar Andrew Walker when she revealed to him that she is pregnant.

"From the moment he found out, he was, like, 'Oh I think I'm nauseous too.' And I'm, like, 'What are you doing?! No you're not!' "DeLoach tells Mark Steines and Debbie Matenopoulos in a PEOPLE exclusive clip from Friday's episode of *Home & Family*.

On the episode, Matenopoulos discusses the reality of "sympathy pains" — but DeLoach isn't having any of it.

"He's telling me ... he had back pain when his wife had back pain and he felt sick when she felt sick and I was, like, 'Stop talking ... no you didn't!' " says the former Awkward star, 37, who wed entertainment lawyer Ryan Goodell in 2009.

"My wife and I ... she'd be, like, 'You don't have the symptoms, Andrew,' " says Walker, who has a son with wife **Cassandra Troy**. "Your feet aren't swollen. You're not hungry all the time.' And I'm, like, 'But you want ramen, I want ramen too! You want pizza, I have this craving for pizza!' "

"That could possibly be true, but as a woman going through it ... I didn't want to hear it," jokes DeLoach.

DeLoach and Walker's episode of *Home & Family* airs Friday at 10 a.m. ET and *The Perfect Catch* premieres Saturday at 9 p.m. ET on Hallmark Channel.



ew celebrities manage to balance real-life and spotlight perfectionism the way Nikki DeLoach does. The Hallmark star has made a major impact on the rom-com world since her first made-for-TV movie with the network in 2015. Yet this Southern girl is decidedly much more than just a pretty face.

Growing up in Georgia, Nikki credits her opportunity and inspiration primarily to one person: "A lot of it had to do with my grandmother ... she loved the movies, I mean loved the movies ... and I stayed with my grandmother a lot. I was with her probably at minimum three nights a week if not more. We would always go to the movie rental store ... and we would rent (especially if I stayed with her all weekend) five different movies—as many as they'd let us rent." They'd watch movies at night and eat popcorn together, Nikki recalls fondly.

Needless to say, she was hooked from girlhood. "My parents will tell you that at three years old I pointed to the TV and said, 'I want to do that!' ... There's never been a time in my life where I've never not known that becoming a storyteller was the thing that I wanted to do as far as my job."

At seven, Nikki really started to pursue professional work in the form of commercials and kids print work. And her grandmother went with her for all of it, even moving with Nikki to Orlando when she landed her first big break on *The Mickey Mouse Club* in the 1990s (cast alongside Britney Spears, Justin Timberlake, Christina Aguilera, Keri Russell, and Ryan Gosling) when she was 12. "When the show was over, she moved with me to Los Angeles for work afterwards."

A slew of acting jobs followed, notably a starring role (opposite Mark Wahlberg and Bill Paxton) in the feature film *Traveller*. She was part of the main cast in the TV series *Misery Loves Company*, and played Anthony LaPaglia's daughter in the television movie *Never Give Up: The Jimmy V Story*.

But in 1997, Nikki decided to take a break from acting, shifting focus to the world of pop music. Signing with RCA and BMG Records, she became a member of the girl group Innosense. When the group disbanded six years later, Nikki reentered Hollywood with sustained success.

She has guest starred on some of TV's biggest hit shows, including NCIS, Criminal Minds, CSI, CSI: NY, Cold Case, Mad Men, and Without a Trace, to name a few, and was a series regular on the popular show North Shore. Nikki's films include Love & Other Drugs, Flying Lessons (opposite Maggie Grace and Hal Holbrook), and the French comedy Hollwoo.

And then came Awkward, a #1 scripted and critically acclaimed series from MTV, in 2011. For five years, Nikki portrayed Lacey Hamilton (one of television's "hottest moms") on the show. Awkward won a People's Choice Award for "Favorite Cable TV Comedy" and was nominated for "Favorite Dramedy" while on the air. It was while still on Awkward that Nikki got her first Hallmark movie role, which actually premiered on Christmas Eve.

"I was home in Georgia over the holidays, and we had a Christmas Eve service, and the pastor was like, 'We gotta get everybody through and get you guys home because Nikki DeLoach is gonna be on Hallmark tonight!' You're talking about a church that has 1,500 to 2,000 people," Nikki reminiscences of the *Christmas*

"I love working in the genre of romantic comedies ... I want to make someone laugh and I also want to make them cry. I want to make them feel everything."

Land debut. "The whole church went home and everyone watched my movie ... I've just never had that type of a reaction from my hometown. Granted, they weren't really the demo for Awkward," she says with a laugh.

"There was an energy, a really connective tissue that existed and I felt it when they would talk to me about the movie," she realized. This experience and feedback deeply resonated within her. Nikki had always wanted to do a Hallmark Christmas movie—watching them, with a bottle of wine while wrapping presents and decorating, has been a secret guilty pleasure of hers for years.

The transition from TV series work to television movies answered multiple desires and needs in one stroke for Nikki. She and husband Ryan Goodell have two children: Hudson, who just started kindergarten, and Bennett, whose birth and risky open-heart surgery was featured in a *People* magazine exclusive in 2017.

Given the nature of her family's personal needs at the time, Nikki's schedule wasn't exactly flexible. "It was actually perfect timing in my life for Hallmark to come in and be like, 'We want to do more with you!'" Shorter shooting schedules allowed her to work and be a mother simultaneously, and she could take the kids with her if need be. "It just actually was the perfect working situation for me for the last couple of years in my life"

Plus, "I love working in the genre of romantic comedies ... I want to make someone laugh and I also want to make them cry. I want to make them feel everything." Hallmark viewers will also recognize Nikki from her starring roles in the network's original movies, including *The Perfect Catch, Christmas Land, A Dream of Christmas, Truly, Madly, Sweetly*, and *Love Takes Flight*, all of which premiered as a Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation.

Nikki's experience and perfectionist tendencies shined when she developed, executive produced, and starred in *Reunited at Christmas*, which premiered on the network last November. "Iloved it—I thrived!" Having worked in film and television in all genres and in so many performing capacities, "if you take everything, all the information, all the knowledge that I have and I bring to the table, it really honestly is the perfect amount of experience that lends itself to being a producer."

Storytelling is a central theme in Nikki's life. Referencing how she was raised, Nikki reached a point in her twenties where she was determined to be simply herself. "Growing up in the South, this was a hard thing for me because while I had this beautiful, idyllic childhood, there was also this expectation of perfection that I got from my family ... I was told everyday, 'This is who you are.'" Of course nothing ill was intended by this, as Nikki clarifies, speaking to the way she, her mother, and her grandmother were all raised. Nevertheless, "I went from a family that expected that of me to an industry that expected that of me. I never in my life had this chance to kinda be like, 'Who am I? Like really and truly, Who

am I outside of this industry? Who am I as a person outside of my family?""

"Jen [Dede] kinda walked into my life at that point in time where I was like, 'I want to wake up and I want to be the most authentic version of myself. And I don't care if it's messy and I don't care if it's ugly. And I don't care if my messiness makes people uncomfortable.' This is important. This is important to living good life." From this revelation, Nikki and Jen co-founded What We Are—what started as a hobby blog has now turned into a platform and a movement for women about women.

A spokesperson for the Alzheimer's Association (in honor of her father, who is living with a rare form of dementia called Pick's disease), Nikki also passionately supports Children's Hospital Los Angeles (CHLA), which provided life-saving care for her son, Bennett—in fact, Nikki and her family now "adopt a family" at CHLA each Christmas, which helps support the most vulnerable and financially challenged patients and their families.


We've seen Nikki's characters in several TV Christmases now, but what does Christmas actually look like in the DeLoach-Goodell household? "It really and truly looks very similar to a Hallmark movie!" To start, the family picks out a real tree at the lot. "I actually am a fan of having really personalized omaments on your tree." She has collected ornaments from all her travels, and puts up those from her kids and her own childhood, too. Matching pajamas on Christmas Eve and morning are a must. Nikki even commits to wearing an ugly sweater almost every day in December! But spending Christmas Eve with extended family in Georgia is her favorite part of the holiday.

Nikki can next be seen in Hallmark's upcoming Christmas movie Two Turtle Doves, opposite Michael Rady. The movie premieres on November 1st on Hallmark Movies & Mysteries. Though Nikki would love to eventually work her way into the director's chair, starring in this latest Christmas movie was a nice break in the action. "It was actually kind of a pleasure just to be responsible for my lines and show up on set," and working with a team that she has nothing but praise for made the experience even more pleasurable—they did "the job that I would have done had I produced it."

"Sometimes you don't produce and you watch. You should always be watching, you should always be observing, because we are never not learning," says Nikki, and one can't help but agree. "It doesn't matter how many times you've done something. If you are in a place where you're like, 'I have nothing left to learn,' then you should probably quit and go do something else."

No matter where one is in life or how perfect something may seem, it's difficult to argue with that ideal—it is in the pursuit of perfection that perfectly imperfect is conceived. Nikki DeLoach is the essence of just that.





The 263rd installment of the Hallmark Hall of Fame franchise takes off on Saturday with the premiere of the Hallmark Channel film *Love Takes Flight. TV Weekly* spoke with actress Nikki DeLoach, who stars in the film alongside Jeff Hephner, Barbara Niven, Tom Thon and adorable newcomer Skylar Olivia Flanagan.

"I am so honored, I am so thrilled, I am so moved to be a part of a Hallmark Hall of Fame movie," says DeLoach.

In the film, DeLoach plays Dr. Lizzie Beauman, a single mother and doctor turned hospital administrator who cares for her patients with almost as much devotion as she lavishes on her 5-year-old daughter (Flanagan), who suffers from an insulin disorder. Lizzie knows firsthand the struggles facing the families of patients, so she works tirelessly to transform her hospital into a world-class treatment center. But the stress of parenthood and her job leads her to micromanage every aspect of her life into a joyless routine. "Work is work, personal is personal, and the two do not mix," explains DeLoach. "She's just a mother who's trying to manage it all. She's trying to be all things to all people, and the last thing on her list is happiness and love for herself - like many of us mommies."

Lizzie's dependence on order is threatened by the arrival of newly hired EMS pilot Charley Allen (Hephner), who challenges her to open her heart and face her fears, particularly her fear of flying. In return, Lizzie helps Charley repair his tumultuous relationship with his father (Thon), as both men have struggled after the death of Charley's mother.

Lizzie's fear of flying is a succinct analogy for why she lives an order-filled life: When you fly in an airplane, your life is in the hands of someone else. They're literally piloting your fate. And flying – like love and friendship – requires reliance on someone else. "I think that is a big thing for Lizzie," explains DeLoach, "wanting to have control over everything that is happening. But that's just not the way life is. We don't always have the answers. It's not always black and white. It sometimes is gray, and we

sometimes have to have faith in the fog that it's all gonna be OK."

DeLoach shares that this same faith guides her in her own life: In 2017, her youngest son Bennett was born with multiple heart defects and had his first open-heart surgery at just 5 days old. "When you go into a real life-or-death situation, you realize just how little control you have over anything. And that's when you really have to dig deep and have the courage to open up and allow yourself to have faith." Today, Bennett is a busy toddler, and DeLoach is grateful for his health and her confidence in facing life's obstacles.

Love Takes Flight also finds inspiration in the real-life, headline-making and life-affirming friendship of a young girl and an elderly man who met in a grocery store aisle. When the preschooler asked the stranger for a birthday hug, they forged a deep bond that pulled the widower from the depths of despair and gave his life renewed purpose. "It's such a beautiful story about finding something to keep you going and understanding that you can create purpose out of your pain," says DeLoach. "This little girl really gives him a new lease on life and inspires him to give him something to live for."

And while Hallmark movies are best known for their heartfelt storylines and romantic moments, they often have wonderful injections of levity. DeLoach shares a behind-the-scenes and unfortunately timed mishap that occurred while shooting the film's romantic climax. "It was this beautiful house we were filming at - right off the water - and the sun is setting. It's just absolutely gorgeous. There are these beautiful trees with Spanish moss hanging everywhere ... and this deluge of sand gnats," she recalls with a giggle. "At one point in time, [Hephner] went in to kiss me for that finale moment and literally pulled away. And he was like, 'You have sand gnats in your mouth." DeLoach's mirth turns into an all-out laugh as she says, "So just when you see that finale scene, and you see how beautiful it is and the emotion and all of that, just know that there are a million sand gnats around us!"

NBT: YOU GREW UP IN BLACKSHEAR, GEORGIA AS THE DAUGHTER OF AN EDUCATOR AND BUSINESS MAN ALONGSIDE YOUR SIBLINGS. PAINT FOR ME A PICTURE OF YOUR LIFE AS A YOUNG NIKKI.

NIKKI: I was a free range child. It was such a small town that everyone knew each other. You were raised by a community, and I believe that taught me how to love a lot of people and also receive love from a lot of people. I don't know if the childhood I had could exist anywhere today, which breaks my heart. All kids should have the experience of roaming the world and letting curiosity guide your adventure. But, the world is a little too scary right now. Half the time I found my own way home after school or basketball practice. I stayed outside playing until it was dark. I went to church every Sunday. My brother was eleven years younger so he didn't come along until a year before I left home to do The Mickey Mouse Club. I had my sister who was my partner in crime and the best sister a gal could ever have. We did everything together. I miss so deeply being with her every day. But, I had the best life growing up in Blackshear, Georgia. That town and everyone in it have a very special place in my heart. Always.

NBT: YOU SHARED A STORY OF BEING A CHILD GOING FOR AUDITIONS WHERE THEY HAD A BOARD WITH NAMES OF TALENT THAT HAD BOOKED A ROLE. AND IT CREATED A VERY COMPETITIVE, UNEVEN PLAYING FIELD. AS A CHILD EXPERIENCING THAT FIRST HAND, HOW DID HAT CHANGE YOUR OUTLOOK ON THE THING YOU LOVED TO DO – ENTERTAIN AND PERFORM? DID IT CREATE IN YOU A CYNICAL OUTLOOK ON LIFE?

NIKKI: It was very competitive but that didn't scare me. I was the child that loved an opportunity to rise to the occasion. It fueled me to know I had competition. I was never in competition with others, only myself. I was lucky enough to play sports growing up, so I spent a lot of time playing on a team. I think team sports are critical for girls. To this day, I love playing on a team. I love collaborating. But it also taught me that your only competition is you. The cynicism didn't really begin to surface until much later in my career. You know, acting is one of very few career paths where it doesn't matter how many years you've been working or how many credits you have, they can still send you back to the very beginning and ask you to start all over. It's disrespectful and unfair. No one would ever tell a Judge - after going to law

school, being a prosecutor, working his/her way up the ladder, putting the 50,000 hours in, and finally becoming a judge - that after all of that they have to start all over and go back to law school and do it all over again. I am not comparing what I do to the importance of a judge. Let me be clear. It's just an example. But, it is asked of actors everyday. I've had to start my career over so many times at this point. You really have to love it to keep going. I love the art, the work. The business of it is truly deplorable sometimes.

NBT: ACTORS ON THE SMALL SCREEN AND BIG SCREEN PLAY A ROLE BECAUSE IT'S THEIR PROFESSION EVEN THOUGH SOME ROLES MAY REQUIRE THEM TO PLAY ROLES THAT HAVE NO CONNECTION TO THEIR LIFE OFF SCREEN. FOR INSTANCE, YOU SAID "I UNDERSTAND WHAT IT IS TO BE IN FRONT OF A CAMERA; I DON'T WANT TO EVER BE MYSELF IN FRONT OF IT. I HAVE TO TRANSFORM INTO THIS PERSON..." MY QUESTION IS: DO YOU THINK THAT THE FOURTH WALL OF CINEMA [ACTING AS A PROFESSION] IN THE U.S. IS BEING DESTROY-ED WHEN CONTROVERSIES AND BACKLASH ARE CREATED WHEN ACTORS DON'T 'PLAY' THE ROLE OF REALITY?

NIKKI: This is a time in our industry of great change and I believe we all have an opportunity to learn and grow through it. I have a commitment to gender parity in the industry. I have been fighting alongside many others for women to get the same opportunities as men. I can't stand behind that without standing behind the inclusion of other oppressed groups. As much as artists would love to be able to play anything, until there is inclusion, commitments have to be made. I don't think that anything is being destroyed, I think we are growing and it's a great thing.

NBT: TO PIGGY BACK OFF THE LAST QUESTION, LAST YEAR SCARLET JOHANSSON WAS SUPPOSED TO PLAY AN ACTUAL TRANS MAN, DANTE 'TEX' GILL IN RUB & TUG BUT SHE DROPPED OUT DUE TO CONTROVERSY OVER HER BEING CASTED FOR THE ROLE. WE'VE SEEN ACTORS LIKE TARON EGERTON PLAY AN OPEN GAY MAN, ELTON JOHN IN ROCKETMAN, BUT EGERTON IS NOT GAY, IN YOUR OPINION DO YOU THINK THAT THE CRAFT OF ACTING IS BEING LOST BECAUSE SOMETIMES WE DON'T GET TO SEE ACTORS PULL OF AMAZING PERFORMANCES BY BRINGING CHARACTERS TO LIFE ON SCREEN?

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NIKKI: Scarlet is a great actress. Taron was incredible in that role. However, that's not the point. Of course, there are very talented actors who could bring to life any role or character. The point is that we make a commitment to fighting for trans and gay actors to obtain those roles. Just as women in the industry have been fighting for a place at the table, we have to fight for others who have also been oppressed to have their seat at that table. Inclusion enriches our storytelling, and representation is important for all of us. This is an opportunity for us to reflect on what is gained from progress, and that's an important distinction from seeing it as what is being "lost." Honestly, I am so excited that you are asking these questions because it is bringing to the forefront that the subject of inclusion is important.

NBT: YOU MUST HAVE STORIES TO TELL ABOUT YOUR EXPERIENCE OF YOUR MUSIC CAREER, TOURING EUROPE AND PLAYING LIVE AT MADISON SQUARE GARDEN AS PART OF THE GIRL GROUP, INNOSENSE. BUT YOU BECAME A VICTIM OF DOUBLE DIPPING AND TRIPLE DIPPING CARRIED OUT BY LOU PEARLMAN. HOW DID THAT EXPERIENCE AFFECT OR CHANGE YOU?

NIKKI: Touring the world and having the opportunity to play Madison Square Garden is a gift I will always be grateful for. But Lou Pearlman didn't just take advantage of me financially, he violated me as a human being. My friend Lance Bass who was in *NSYNC produced a fantastic documentary about Lou. I would recommend that everyone watch it. It's very real, very honest. My experience in the music business changed me forever because it showed me what people are capable of. The good thing it taught me was to trust my gut, not just about situations but also about people. My instincts have always been right. It's when I've gone against them that I've gotten myself in a pickle. I've learned to surround myself with people I trust. Right now, that's my entertainment attorney (aka My Husband). My husband went through the same thing with Lou. After it ended, he went to law school. He wanted to protect others from being taken advantage of. The problem is that there is often a lack of moral integrity in this industry. People's words don't align with their actions. Some people are willing to do whatever it takes to get ahead. For me, it's just not that important for me to "make it" if I have to betray others to get there or go against my moral integrity. You have to be very

careful who you align yourself with in business. That was one of the greatest lessons of the music business. It also taught me to be even more fierce with my integrity, grace, and thoughtfulness. I am a big believer in BEING that thing you would like to see shifted in others. BE the change. BE the good.

NBT: SEEING HOW THE MUSIC INDUSTRY HAS EVOLVED A LOT FROM CASSETTE TAPES, TO CDS TO MP3 AND NOW STREAMING. FROM THE WAY ARTISTS WERE MANAGED TO THE WAY DEALS WERE MADE BACK THEN, COMPARED TO THE WAY THE INDUSTRY IS NOW. BASED ON YOUR EXPERIENCE BACK THEN VERSUS TODAY, DO YOU THINK THE UNDERLYING FRAMEWORK OF THE INDUSTRY HAS CHANGED?

NIKKI: I haven't been in the music industry for quite some time, however, I know from my friends who are still in the industry that it has changed dramatically. I think the underlying framework for almost all entertainment industries has shifted. The way people consume their entertainment has shifted a great deal. So, you either change with the times or get left behind. I miss the way music used to be consumed. I miss going to stores and buying a CD. I also love that I don't have to travel with a binder of all my favorite albums. Instead, I can stream it from one device. It's much more efficient and environmentally friendly. The one thing that I hope never changes is the public's desire to attend live shows.

NBT: GROWING UP IN THE ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY MADE YOU A CHILD STAR. MOST TESTIMONIES WE HEAR ABOUT CHILD STARS BY THE TIME THEY GET TO ADULTHOOD, THE OUTCOMES ARE NOT USUALLY POSITIVE BUT YOUR STORY IS QUITE DIFFERENT, YOU SHARED THAT THE REASON YOU DIDN'T END UP LIKE MOST CHILD STARS IS BECAUSE OF FAILURE; IT HUMBLED YOU. MY QUESTION IS, HOW DOES SOMEONE CONSCIOUSLY REEXAMINE THEIR LIFE AND WHAT'S ACTUALLY IMPORTANT?

NIKKI: Your questions are so insightful! I love it. That's actually a really great question. It starts with acknowledging that something in you or your life doesn't feel aligned with who you are. You know when something feels off inside of you. You start thinking, "Why am I not happy? Why don't I feel fulfilled? Why am I being self-destructive? What actually matters most in life? This doesn't feel good. This doesn't feel right." I have always been a

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person who goes after something with everything I've got. That includes my well-being and happiness. I'll be damned if I look back at my life when I am 100 years old and see that I spent the majority of my life unsatisfied, unhappy, or unaware. Luckily, I was smart enough to choose some very good people to hang on to who really helped me figure these things out. I had some amazing teachers.

NBT: AFTER YOU LEFT THE MUSIC BUSINESS, YOU WENT TO COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND LIVED OUT THE REST OF YOUR RECORD CONTRACT. HOW DOES A PERSON WHO COMES FROM A WELL-KNIT FAMILY COME BACK FROM SUCH A CAREER ALTERING EXPERIENCE LIKE WHAT HAPPENED WITH LOU PEARLMAN? SUCH EVENTS OFTEN PARALYZE PEOPLE'S THINKING FOR LIFE; HOW DID YOU COME OUT FROM ALL THAT?

NIKKI: It was tough. It was really tough actually. I was completely disillusioned, betrayed, and I carried a deep creative wound. The smartest thing I ever did for my career was take a big step back, go to college, and surround myself with people who were interested and focused on everything that was not the entertainment industry. I became very politically and socially involved. When I would volunteer in low income communities it became very clear that even though I had suffered something very painful, I was much better off than so many. After the music business, I was left with very little financially. But, I did have a roof over my head and clothes on my back. I had people I could turn to for help. I started asking myself, "How can I be of service in this world?" It really made me see that there is more to life than obtaining my dream of being an artist. Is that important? Absolutely. Dreams and desire and passion. Those are all very important things. But our purpose here in this world is much deeper. I thank God everything fell apart in my life because of the music business because that's when I started to figure that out.

NBT: CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY HAS BEEN A VITAL PART OF CORPORATIONS. SOME KEEP TO THEIR WORD BY DOING EXACTLY WHAT THEY [CORPORATIONS] SAY IN THEIR CSR. YOU OFTEN SAY THAT HALLMARK IS A GREAT COMPANY TO WORK FOR AND HOW THEY HELPED YOU WHEN YOU WERE PREGNANT WITH YOUR SON WHO WAS BORN WITH HEART DEFECTS. WHY DO YOU THINK HALLMARK CHOSE TO MAKE SUCH A MOVE?

NIKKI: Because when they say they are about family, they mean it. When you work in the Hallmark world, you become a part of their family. They really care about you. I will be forever grateful to them for how they've supported my family through these last few years.

NBT: I WATCHED YOUR WALK TO END ALZHEIMERS' PSA VIDEO, HOW DID YOU GATHER COURAGE AND STRENGTH TO PUT TOGETHER THOSE WORDS IN THE ANNOUNCEMENT KNOWING THAT IT WAS AFFECTING YOUR FAMILY SO CLOSE TO HOME? WE TEND TO EXPRESS OURSELVES FREELY WHEN EVENTS ARE DISTANT FROM US; WE TEND TO LOOK WITHIN OURSELVES TO PULL OUT EMPATHY FOR OTHERS. BUT WHEN IT'S CLOSE TO HOME, IT'S DIFFERENT. HOW DID YOU FIND STRENGTH AND COURAGE FOR THAT?

NIKKI: Thank you so much for taking the time to watch my video and thank you for your kind words. I did it for my dad, my papa (grandfather), and the millions of others who have been affected by this horrible disease. I vowed to my papa and dad that I would fight for them the way they've fought for me my entire life. And anything worth having is worth being vulnerable for. Vulnerability is our superpower.

NBT: GOING THROUGH OUR RESEARCH, I FOUND THAT YOU ARE VERY MULTI-FACETED. YOU GET INVOLVED IN A LOT OF AREAS THAT DIRECTLY AFFECT HUMANITY: POLITICAL CONVERSATIONS, SPORTS CONVERSATIONS AND CONVERSATIONS ABOUT HEALTH. WHAT'S YOUR VIEW ON THE CURRENT GEOPOLITICAL STATE?

NIKKI: How much time do you have? I think the United States is in a very dangerous state, and we all need to be awake, alert and ready to take action. People are hurting. People are struggling. And no one in our current administration is listening because they don't care. They care about status, maintaining their political power and money. When we stop caring about humanity, when we've ceased to lead from a place of compassion and gratitude, then we are in a very dangerous place. I am hoping this election turns this train around. If not, I am very scared for what the future may bring.

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NBT: LOOKING WITHIN THE U.S. AND THE CURRENT LINEUP OF CANDIDATES RUNNING FOR PRESIDENCY. WHO DO YOU THINK HAS THE BEST CHANCE TO BE ELECTED? WHY?

NIKKI: I haven't decided yet. I think we have some excellent candidates. I love Elizabeth Warren and have for many years. She's smart, fierce, charming, compassionate, and she's leading on policy. Sanders is a force. I think either of them would command a debate stage. Joe Biden is the front runner right now. And there are so many things that are great about him. However, I am not sure he really wants it or if he stepped forward because he loves our country and knows he is one of our best shots. I love Beto and Pete! Honestly, I think we have some of the best and brightest on that stage.

NBT: YOU FOUNDED THE 'WHAT WE ARE' BLOG COMMUNITY, WHAT IS YOUR OVERALL VISION FOR THE SITE?

NIKKI: Jen and I want to give women a stage to get messy, be the authentic versions of themselves, and get vulnerable and open. That's always been the vision.

NBT: YOU MADE A STATEMENT THAT I THINK WAS PROFOUND, "WHEN YOU THINK THERE'S A GOD AND HE'S IN CONTROL OF OUR LIVES, THEREFORE WE DON'T HAVE TO ASK THE 'WHYS' OR STRESS ABOUT, 'WHAT IF I DID THIS? IS THIS GOING TO HAPPEN WITH MY CAREER?' WE ARE IN CONSTANT ANXIETY AND FEAR. BUT IF YOU ARE IN A CONSTANT STATE OF SURRENDER, STRESS DOESN'T EXIST." HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE OR EXPLAIN YOUR SPIRITUAL STATE?

NIKKI: I am still in surrender... a constant state of surrender. Thank you so much for these incredible questions. It's an honor and a privilege to have these conversations.

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NIKKI DELOACH

YV: Tell us about your first role on the Hallmark network. Now as one of Hallmark's leading actress, what are some of the movies coming out this year that we can see you in?

Nikki: My first role on Hallmark was a movie called Christmas Land. To this day, it is one of my favorite experiences. I loved our producers and director so much. It makes such a difference in the ease and joy of the experience when those positions are filled with people who are wonderful. We filmed in Utah. It was gorgeous. I had two movies air earlier this year: Love to the Rescue and Love Takes Flight. For this upcoming holiday season, I did a movie called Two Turtle Doves. I was reunited with Michael Rady and Michaela Russell which was a dream. I cannot even begin to express how deep my affection goes for both of them. One of the greatest gifts of this movie was working with director, Lesley Demetriades. This was her first time directing for Hallmark but the third movie we did this year together. I just love her, and she's a terrific director. The movie will air November 1st on Hallmark Movies and Mysteries.

YV: How did you begin your acting career? What inspired you to become an actress? Is there a role that you want that you haven't portrayed yet?

Nikki: I fell in love with movies at such a young age. I knew I wanted to be a storyteller since the age of three. I made it a profession by 7 years old. I watched movies all the time with my nana. It was our thing. On the nights I would stay with her (which were a lot), we would go to the video store and rent several movies, go home, and settle in. She would often make me French toast or peanut butter toast, or cheese toast. I am a big fan of anything that involves bread and butter. I was inspired by those evenings, sitting with my nana and being transported to another world. When I saw 'Singing in the Rain' the first time, I thought my body was going to explode. Barbara Streisand in Funny Girl was a revelation. I wanted to make someone feel the way those characters and the stories they told made me feel. There are so many roles I haven't had the opportunity to play yet that would definitely be a dream. My new thing is playing a medical professional on TV. After going through what we have with my youngest son, I am obsessed with nurses, doctors, and surgeons. I just think what they do is incredible.

YV: You are co-founder of "What We Are", can you tell us about it? What is the mission statement?

Nikki: "What We Are" was founded by myself and Jen Dede Kelly, one of my dearest friends several years ago because we had learned a few things and wanted to share that with others. The first thing was that vulnerability was your superpower. We had learned that living an authentic life was dependent on your ability to get vulnerable and open. We also learned that you don't have to go through pain or messiness or heartbreak in isolation. As women, we often go away and clean everything up, put everything back together again so that we can face the world with a smile. It's unfair and unhealthy. Finally, we wanted to lift up all the women we knew - all incredible ladies with beautiful, important stories to tell.

YV: Besides acting, you are a supporter and spokesperson for The Alzheimer's Association and work with Children's Hospital Los Angeles. Can you tell us what lead you to take on this role?

Nikki: My personal experience. In the summer of 2017, I was pregnant with my second child, and I found out he had multiple heart defects. Five days later, I found out that my dad had Pick's Disease, a rare and aggressive form of dementia. My life as I knew it was forever changed. Now, at the time, I didn't know just how profound that change was going to be. All I could feel was paralyzing

fear and deep sadness and pain. I made a choice inside of that fear and pain to move through this whole gut-wrenching, earth shaking experience with openness and vulnerability. I was not going to run away from it or escape it. I gave myself permission to feel every ounce of it. And something pretty wonderful happened...I found magic and miracles throughout. With an open heart, you see everything for what it is. What I knew to be true in my heart was that Children's Hospital of Los Angeles was going to save my child's life. And they did. I watched them do it. Not once, but three times. I've seen the lengths that they will go to save the life of a child. It's the most inspirational thing to stand inside of. I also know that millions of children are dependent on the life-saving services provided by Children's Hospital of Los Angeles, and I wanted to work side by side with them to make sure we protect that always. I found the same kind of magic with The Alzheimer's Association - a group of people who have completely dedicated themselves to finding a cure for this horrible disease. Getting involved is the best way to turn your pain into purpose. My dad would have never given up on me, and I will not give up on him.

YV: How does it feel to transition from actress to executive producer?

Nikki: I love it. It feels fulfilling. I have always wanted to produce. When I was on sets as a child, I would ask how I could become the industry's youngest producer. Of course, that did not happen. Everything has its perfect timing. I love being able to take the seed of an idea, develop it into a story, and then bring that story to life. It's just the coolest process ever!

YV: Are you currently working on any projects? What can we expect to see from you in 2020?

Nikki: I am currently developing and writing. I will probably get back on set toward the end of next year for projects that will come out in 2020.


YV: We learned a lot about your career but how about your personal life. Do you like to cook? What is your favorite thing to eat? What do you like to do for fun? Do you like to travel? And favorite movie of all time?

Nikki: I love to cook when I can do it with ease. That has not been the case in the last two years. Now, I am trying to cook with one starving kid on my hip and the other starving kid hanging on my leg. And while I love my kids more than anything else in this world, they make it difficult to get a meal cooked in a relaxing, non-chaotic environment. I love sushi. I could eat it every day. For fun, I love hanging out with my girlfriends. It doesn't matter what we do, I just love time with them. I love going to the Farmer's Market with my kids and husband. I love to workout. I love going to baseball and football games. I love traveling. There hasn't been much time for vacations, but my husband and I just went on our first in seven years and it was so fun! There is no way I could pick a favorite movie. Not a chance...but two of my all-time favorites I mentioned above.

Congratulations on the upcoming season four of AWKWARD! Did you think the show had this much staying power when you first took the role of Lacey Hamilton? Nikki DeLoach: I definitely knew that we had something special with AWKWARD. I also felt like we had staying power, However, I had no expectations, because you just never know how something will be received. So many factors have to come together to create a great show. Then, you have to get people to tune in every week. The stars have to align, and I am so grateful that they aligned for us on AWKWARD.

In the last episode, we see Lacey and Jenna have a real mother/daughter moment-probably one of the most important ones in the history of the show since it relates back to the "carefrontation" letter in the pilot. Do you think moments like those make up for Lacey's not-so-great parenting? Despite the fact that AWKWARD is a comedy, we have always sought to present an authentic mother/daughter journey. That means showing the pain that mothers can sometimes unknowingly cause their daughters, as well as the heartbreak that daughters can sometimes cause their mothers. We have also shown how a mother and daughter can find their way to forgiveness. Those moments that Jenna and Lacey share not only grow their relationship together, but grow them both as individuals, and I absolutely believe they make up for Lacey's past mistakes.

How are you enjoying being a fairly new mother yourself? Do you have any favorite moments of your own? It's the greatest thing that has ever happened to me. I would love to say, "Every moment is my favorite moment," but I would be a liar. When [my son] was crying non-stop for almost six weeks straight, those moments were really tough. I love when he smiles; it is pure joy and lights up every room. I love watching him discover the world. For me, it's like re-discovering the world through fresh, innocent eyes.

Do you think any of Lacey's parenting skills (or lack thereof) will be useful for when your son becomes a teenager? I do feel like Lacey's parenting skills will be useful because she is very communicative with her daughter, which I feel is important. She tries her best and is very well-intentioned. Kids can sense that. Also, she has the strength to discipline when need be, as we learned in season three. I feel like that is one of the more essential characteristics of a good parent. If you don't teach a child how to be disciplined, they won't possess it later

One of the show's early driving forces is that infamous "carefrontation" letter, written by Lacey. It completely alters Jenna's opinion of herself and perhaps her entire high school experience to date. What was Lacey's intention there?

It was Lacey's intention that the letter alter Jenna's opinion of herself and her high school experience, but in a positive way. Lacey thought that she was helping Jenna by suggesting that she take those actions. She had no idea that it would backfire the way it did. Lacey thought that she would help Jenna to be more outgoing, confident, and up level her whole high school experience. Lacey always has the best of intentions, but her execution of things is often flawed. I like to say that she has a very inadequate skill set; however, that skill set has definitely improved over the years.

How do you think you would've reacted if you were in Jenna's shoes? I know how I would have reacted. because I have been in that situation with my own mother. Most daughters have! That's why the story is so relatable. Every mother has done something that they thought would help their daughter, but in the end, it hurt them. As a kid, you feel like something must be really broken about you if your own mother doesn't love and accept you for who you are. As a mother, you think you are helping.

Jenna and her friends really have it rough! Was your high school experience ever as dramatic and intense as what these teens have been experiencing? I didn't go to a regular high school, I was working; therefore, I was tutored on each set. I also finished high school in two years. There's very little drama when it's just you, your school books, and a teacher.

Lucky you! How do you think you would've fared in the high school environment created by AWKWARD? Let's just say I probably would have spent a lot of time in Valerie's office. Of course. I would've been in love with Matty, too. Who isn't?

Being a small-town girl, what prompted your big Hollywood dreams? My parents always said that I came into this world already knowing what I wanted to do with my life. I started performing at 3 years old. I think it was just part of my life-curriculum to be creative and pursue my dreams in this industry. There were definitely certain movies and performances that inspired me. Furmy Girl is one of my favorite movies of all time, and Barbara Streisand's performance is perfect. I have always been obsessed with movies and music. As a kid, I would write out all. of the dialogue of a movie and force my sister to act out every scene with me. I was a real nuisance.

What would you say has been the highlight of your career so far? First of all, every job, and every person, has left an imprint on my career and who I am as a person. However, there are a few highlights that stand out. One is the Mickey Mouse Club. I was able to sing, dance, and act (both comedy and drama) with twenty other kids who shared the same interests as I did.





What a dream job for a kid! AWKWARD has been a hoge highlight in my career as well. It has made me grow as an actor and as a human being. We are a real family on the show. I get to work with people I love, with a character I adore, and with writing that leaves me inspired and challenged on a weekly basis. It's been such a gift!

What kind of roles do you look forward to getting in the future? Anything you've been dying to try? There are so many roles that I am dying to do, like a movie musical or Holly Hunter's role in Broadcast News. I mostly want to continue to push myself as an actor in both comedy and drama. If I read something and it scares me a little or a lot, I want to run towards that. I want to build relationships with other creatives and have a great time working together. I am really just open to anything and everything that inspires and scares me.

AWKWARD does a fantastic job of blending unconventional with important life lessons. What do you think is most important to take away from the show? This show is so incredible because it touches upon all that young women and men experience in high school. From bullying to sex, body image to mother/ daughter troubles, AWKWARD moves through these issues with heart and humor. I loved the ending of season three, where Jenna realizes that she doesn't need a guy to dance with her at the prom; she can be happy dancing all by herself. Jenna has learned that she must love herself first. She no longer needs a guy to define her self-worth or validate her. It's such an important life lesson.

The highly anticipated season four premieres on April 15th at 10pm/9c! What are you allowed to tell us about it? Nothing. Absolutely nothing!





The Southerner, former Mouseketeer and girl band member, and MTV top-rating show co-star is most excited for her role of a lifetime: mother to Hudson. Nikki Deloach is feeling everything but 'awkward' when it comes to raising and caring for her adorable, blond and blue-eyed darling

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t's hard to ignore Nikki
Del.coch as her character
"Lacty" in MTV's phenomenal
teen dramech, Aurkvard not
just because of the miracles
brought on by her amazing push-up
bras on the show, but more so because
of her spot on acting. Nikki plays a
young mother to an only child on the
show—she was a former popular girl
who got pregnant in high school by

the man she later on married. In the first season of the show, much is played up on the relationship of her character and of the lead's (her daughter). Jenua (actress Ashky Rickards), because she wrote a horrible, anonymous note of advice from 'a friend' to her daughter about the latter's seeming insignificance—the message may be summed up to one of the letter's lines: "As you are now, you could disappear

and no one would notice." Their dynamic tugs on the hearestrings of many well-intentioned parents who tend to do more damage than good, unknowingly. We ask Nikki about how she's similar to her character, how it was like feeling overtaken by her former Moseskereens, leaving home at 12, being like a sister to Justin Timberlake, meeting husband, Ryan, and being mom to gorgeous little Hudson.



Kariz: You are great on the show, I just have to say. You made me believe that you are actually Lacey.

Nikkt That means so much to me! Thank you so much.

K: Absolutely great. So how was it like growing up in Georgia? I heard you are the eldest of three.

N: Yes, I am the eldest of three, and my sister and I were about 3 and 1/2 years apart, so it was really nice because I had a friend for life. I really couldn't have asked for a better upbringing. We live on a farm and there's so much space, and you could be out 'til dark and our parents didn't have to worry. All the kids amound you could play with, and we'd play basketball everyday. I have a son now and he's 7 months old, and I yearn to be able to give him something similar to what I had, but I don't know if I can do that in Los Angeles.

K: You had the whole shebang, farm animals, everything? I love that.

N: Yeah, I rode borses. In the summers,

we'd pick com, green beans, and grow all of our vegetables for the year. All of our meat came from our animals on the farm.

K: You were arganic from the get-go. How were your parents like?

Ne I was organic from the start. My mother was a teacher but she also was a domestic instructor, a cheerleader sponsor. She always had a million balls in the air. She was very determined, an incredibly gifted educator. And now, she's the superintendent of the school system. She was really hard on me, but what I now understand as an adult, especially as a mother, is that you want the absolute best for your kids.

K: Absolutely.

Ne As a child, I interpreted her behavior as I just wasn't good enough and I could never be enough for her, or validated, or be accepted by her. Now, I understand that it was her teaching me self-discipline, and me understanding that I could do anything that I wanted to do in life. It didn't matter if I was a girl or a boy, or how young or old. She also helped to instill in me a really strong work ethic. I look back and think, wow, I'm really grateful for her. Some people say you choose your parents, and nw mom and I have gone through definitely a difficult journey in our lives trying to understand each other-my trying to understand her baggage and her life, and her trying to understand my own because I left home when I was 12 years old to go work, and I haven't lived at home since then. This amazing thing happened on my way to giving birth to Hudson where at the time, I thought it was just a work thing, I was 2 weeks late, I've been having contractions and my mom said, "I'm hopping on a plane and you're gonna give birth too, and I just don't wanna miss it." She hopped on a plane and sure enough, I did not give birth. It was a week that went by before I gave birth at the hospital. By then, I was already a week late and everyday we walked, talked, and ate. I never really had that time with her. I got to hear

about how motherhood was for her at 21 years old when she first had a kid. We just healed our relationship in such a beautiful way, and I am so glad I chose her as my mother. My dad was always that rock, the one who took us to school every morning. He even tried to do my hair-but I can't go to school with seven ponytails. (Laughs) He was also really hard on me in some way, and he was athletic. He coached me at basketball and softball. I was the firstborn, so I was the boy and the girl.

K: For 3 and 1/2 years, it was all you.

Ne It was all me. But he just had this loving kindness that, to this day, when I would get in trouble, he would be the one to sit down with me and talk it through with me. I always felt his warmth, love, and support. Man, I can't tell you what it's like growing up with a father like that as a girl. You look at other men with such confidence, like, I don't have to take something that I don't deserve because I know what a real man is.

K: Exactly. He set the bar high.

№ He woke up with us—all three kids every night to give us our bottle, he changed the diapers, cooked, took us to school, took me to dance and voice lessons. He would drive 2 hours one way, 2 hours back, and get up at 5 AM to go to work. He was superdad, I warned my busband in the beginning, I said, "Listen-"

K: You got big shoes to fill.

№ Yeah, you got big shoes to fill because I had superdad, you know...

K: Your mom was 21 when she had you, and your father was how old?

Ne My father was 24. I'm 34, and I just had my first kid. I know it was a different

time, but to have your first kid at 21 years old? It's something that's so difficult for me to wrap my head around.

K: You said you left home at 12 to move to Orlando to work in the Mickey Mouse Club alongside some of the biggest names in today's entertainment scene. How was that like?

N: It was a dream come true. Just to be able to be part of the show, and what the show represents is iconic. To be able to be part of its legacy is an honor and truly a blessing, and I could not have asked to have better castmates. The seven of us, we were family from day one-and to be surrounded by so much talent and everyday be inspired by them? Seeing Christina Aguilera at 12 years old singjust blew my mind. It rocked my world, it was like there was some singing music box. A lot of us have come from these small towns where, from the time when we were kids, this is what we had warnted to do and it's all we've dreamed of. It never ever seemed like a job-# was playtime and it was fun, and so just seeing yourself in someone else's eyes and to finally go, "Oh, I understand you. I know who you are because I am you." I felt like I had finally found this home-a home I never knew existed before-so it was really a wonderful time in my life. and to this day, some of the best years of my life.

K: Is it true that you still keep in touch with Justin Timbertake?

N: Yeah, I also touch base with T.I. Fantini, who's another east member. But Justin and I, from day one, we hit it off as friends and he's a great guy. Let's talk about how amazingly talented he ishe'a genius. But in terms of as a person, I loved his whole family.

K: You lived with them, right?

N: Actually, his mother wanted to put together a girl group when Justin was in 'NSYNC, so we kinda put our heads together and ended up with five girls. She was like a second mom to me for a really long time-still is. She'll still tell me you know-pardon my language-if my shit stinks. Or if I need to get it together, if I'm doing a really good job, and she's proud of me. I appreciate that.

K: You have two mothers, that's great. In line with the whole Mousketeer-ing, you mentioned in another interview that you felt somewhat bypassed that all of them were blowing up with their careers...

N: I felt left behind for sure, and a part of me felt that, well, this is it for me. It's really weird when you grow up in this industry all your life, and you learn very quickly the culture of this industry that-

K: It's very fleeting.

N: And you are validated by how famous or what your last project was, or what your next project is. All of these friends of mine had gone on to become some of the biggest stars in the world. (Laughs) I think that only exacerbated the feeling that I'm not really good enough and I'm not worthy-and that they have what it takes and I don't and somebody sees something special in them, and they don't see it in me. It took me a really long time to understand that my journey is just as precious and special. I am so grateful for those times when I felt like a failure, and everything felt hard and I had to start all over again, and again, and again, because I'm so thankful for work. There's not a day that goes by when I'm in Awkward that I'm not grateful to be able to be a part of it. I also now understand that I can stand on my own two feet and this business will never validate me-it never will be what truly brings

 NIKKI, ON THE STRUGGLES OF HOLLYWOOD AFTER HER CAREER AS A MOUSEKETEER me joy. It may bring me happiness, but joy, that feeling, that thing that exists inside of you no matter what the exterior circumstances are—this business will never bring me that.

K: It must have just been so hard at that stage, as a teenager, with all those hormones, those crazy feelings.

Ne Yeah, it was awful. I remember being in L.A. with my Nana, and sometimes just locking myself in the bathroom and sitting in the tub—no water, no nothing, just with my clothes on and crying and feeling like, what am I gonna do? What am I doing wrong? And I had to pay my rent and get a job if I wanna keep doing what I love, so it was really hard.

K: Did you ever go through schooling, up to college, or you went a different route?

N: I did, actually: College was very important to me-my mom was an educator. Somebody asked me the other day when I feel the sexiest, and for me, it was when I feel educated. I went to the University of Nebraska, which has an on-location program. I had a tutor, essentially a point person, and they would send all my tests and materials through him. He would send them back to school, and I actually graduated two years early, with all straight A's. I had a graduation ceremony with Lance Bass from 'NSYNC, it was just the two of us. It was really special because you miss a lot of normalcy growing up in this business and it was just a sliver of a 'normal' that we got to have the cap and the gown. Our families and friends were there.

K: Smallest graduating class ever.

Ne I know, and it was so great and after that, I west into the music business until I moved out to L.A. at 22. We were signed to Lou Pearlman, who also launched 'NSYNC and Backstruet Boys, and he's now in jail because of his really unfortunate business practices. 'NSYNC left him, a lot of groups left him, and record companies didn't wanna deal with him and essentially, our group lost our recording contract from RCA. Lou said, 'I'll release you, just sign this agreement. You can make me a fifth member of your band—" which is what he had done with all the other people, "I'll continue to help you." At that point in time I was like, "Over my dead body." Either way, I was done with him. I was in such a dark place at that point, so disillusioned that I just decided, if I get don't get out of here, I'm gonna die here spiritually. So I moved out to L.A. with my boyfriend at the time, who's now my husband.

K: That's so sweet.

Ne I had over a year and a half left in my recording contract and I decided to go to community college, put my feet on the ground, and figure my shit out. I was kinda spinning, and I went to Santa Monica Community College, and I got the first two years of my college degree under my belt. It was the greatest thing in the world that I could've done. I mean, talk about bringing your confidence back.

K: Absolutely.

Ne It just made me feel like there's a lot more going on in this world than the music group, this thing, you know. I was so engrossed in sociology and

psychology. About 5 days after my music contract officially ended, I went on my first real audition since I've been out there for a network pilot. I was like, "Listen this is my first audition, really back in the game after my contract ended." And 2 days later, I was in Hawaii filming a pilot.

K: Wow. (Laughs)

No. Yeah, you just need to take the time and the universe will be there whenever you get back on your feet.

K: Did you have any 'awkward' college experiences?

Ne Being recognized. (Laughs)
Going to community college,
and being broke as a joke. Not
being able to afford groceries
and being this 23-year old in
community college, and then
getting noticed like, "Were you

in that group, Innosense? I think I saw you in Vegas," or "Weren't you in the Mickey Mouse Club?" Things like that. And they would be like, "What are you doing here?"

K: We were told by your publicist that you are one of the kindest people she knows. I see it. How do you stay humble in this industry, as you're in a hit show and all that? Do you think it has a lot to do with what you went through?

N: It's so nice that you said that, first of all, just so sweet. I will thank her. It has everything to do with what I went through. My mother would tell me everyday, "Pretty is as pretty does." I grew up knowing that it doesn't matter what you look like on the outside, it's who you are on the inside that matters. I've made so many mistakes and done things that I was like, "Oh, Nikki why did you do or say that?" But you rebound from those and you say, "I'm gonna do better next time." I could've gone the other way, been that jaded person that's like, "Hey, now it's my turn..." Everyday you wake up with a choice. I've been with my husband for 14 years, and people ask



how that happened.

K: Especially in your industry.

N: I wake up next to him every day. I look at him and I say, "I choose you, you're my gry."

K: Very powerful words.

N: You could choose happiness, you could choose to be jaded, or grateful. I just warma be a person who lives my life with a lot of joy, and I can't do that if I wake up everyday and choose anger, resentment, or frustration.

K: You're so blessed. Now you have a beby boy—so much things going on for you. Let's talk about Awkward for a bit. Can you describe your character in three words? And how you get the role in the first place.

N: Well-intentioned...I'm trying to figure out a word for lack of a skill set? (Laughs)

K: (Laughs) Sometimes inappropriate. So furmy.

N: Well-intentioned, bright, and shiny.

K: (Laughs) She is!

They had been looking for an actress for this role for quite some time, and as what usually happens in the business, they go through all the names first and then they go through all the people that are at the top agencies. CAA, UCA—

and then they start reaching out to everyone else.

K: I love how you put that.

No I was not in one of those agencies, but I had this really "go get 'em" agent and he just kept poshing me to read the pilot, and go in on the audition. I kept saying to him, "Joey, I've gone in on auditions for mothers all season long, and I keep getting told I'm too young," And then to play a morn of a freshman? Like, this is a no. No, no, no.

K: Not gonna happen.

Ne Then he called back and he was like, they realized they've seen you before, they know how young you are. So I read the pilot, and it was literally the best pilot I have read in years. It was such a different voice.

K: It's so well-written.

Ne It had this perfect mixture of humor and heart, and I just thought, I just want 5 minutes in a room to play this person because there was something inside of me that can bring Lacey to life because



she's so different from me. If I can bring her to life, I can do anything. I just loved her, and I guess a lot of other actors saw her as being this really cold, kind of bitchy mom. She had a kid at 16 years old, what do you espect? The creator, Lauren Iungerich, just looked at me and was like, "Oh my God, you're her." I tested for it and eventually. I get it.

K: In the first season, Lacey wrote this awful and hearthreaking letter to Jenna about coming out of her shell. Would you ever do the same to your son, Hudson, if

you felt like he was not adapting?

Ne Here's the thing about motherhood: I think these are things you think you'll never do, and there are things you think you always do. I've learned to never say never, and never say always. Except with Hudson, because I will always love him, but I think that the reason that Lacey and her relationship with Jenna is so compelling in because it's so universal. We heighten the situation because it's comedy and it's TV, but every mother knows what it feels like to do something with the best of intentions and have it go

hombly away, interpreted by your child in such a different way than what you thought it would be. I would like to think that by the time Hudson is a freshman in high school and he's going through something like this, I will be really quick to handle it, instead of giving him a confrontation, I'm sure that I will muck it up some other way, and I'll have to ask for forgiveness.

K: After that letter, your husband on the show almost left you for good. In real life, if your spouse had committed something so hurtful to your kid, do you think you'd leave or stick it out?

Ne There's another thing where you say never and always. You never know in life and I've never been that person who, when people ask me about my marriage, it's like, "Oh

yeah, we're gonna be together for the rest of our lives." I sure hope so. He is the best. I wouldn't know what to do without him. But you never know what life is gonna give you. In terms of him doing something that hurt. Hudson, that definitely would have to be dependent on the situation.

K: Let's talk about your husband, Ryan. Is it true that he was formerly from the band Take Five before he became an entertainment lawyer?

N: That is very true. I was lucky. I got the





musician spirit.

K: So how did you two meet, and was it love at first sight? (Laughs)

N: (Laughs) I was in a place where I definitely was not looking for a boyfriend or a relationship. I got out of a long-term relationship-

K: This was with JC Chasez right? For five years?

N: Yes. I was not looking for anything serious whatsoever, and I could tell Rvan was the guy you settle down with. He's the guy you get serious with. There was this part of me that was like, "Oh my gosh, I have to pursue this and see where this goes because he's so kind and such a good person." I promised miself I would only look for the nicest gay from there on-the ones that know how to treat a girl. And he was that guy.

K: You both had your musical careers at that time, right?

N: Yeah, we were so young and he was on tour, and I was on tour-I was having so much fun being a girl with other girls. I just did not want anything serious at all, so it wasn't love at first sight because I was being crowded by-

K: All the noise.

N: All the noise, and my own personal needs that I wanted at that time in my life. We dated and about 4 months into it, he was just kinda like, "Listen, why don't you go do your thing and if we are ready to pursue this in a more serious way, then give me a call." He did that very adult thing-and he's a year younger than me so I was like-

N: Here is a 19-year old kid that's doing this adult responsible thing. So I went away and months went on and the more I thought about it, I felt like, "What am I doing?"

K: You met him through friends?

Nt I met him when he was in the group

Take Fire. He was also signed to Lou Pearlman, so he lived in Orlando and you know when you're down there, we all interacted.

K: How long were you together before he proposed, and how did he pop the question?

Nr. (Laughs) We were together for 10 years. We had a really good friend who was kinda like a morn to both of us. She has known me for a very long time and she said to Ryan, "Right now you can't really push Nikki. You need to try to be her friend and hang out with her. If you push her, she's gonna run away." He just said, "Well, what if I just came over and brought over some Chinese food?" We just sat, had a drink, and

chilled. I was like, I think that sounds double. So he brought over Chinese food, a bottle of wine, and one rose. We ate, talked for hours, and when he proposed, he had the same red roses and there were candles all around the apartment. I was like, "What is going on?" That's not what we discussed—

K: (Laughs) That's not what was discussed in the package.

N: Exactly! I knew something was up, it was just too romantic. I was thinking, "What is going on?" And he was saying, "Nothing, I just want to have a nice, romantic clinner." We finished our dinner, and he didn't eat a thing because he was so nervous. Finally at the end of it, he gave me this fortune cookie, and

it said-

K: Here's your future.

N: Yeah, "Will you marry me?"

K: That is so sweet.

N: And he then pulled the ring out.

K: That is the sweetest. Fast forward to your pregnancy. Were there any difficulties, furny experiences, odd cravings?

N: I was sick for the first 5 months—all day. In the first trimester, you're just so exhausted. That first wave of tiredness hits you, and it's like I've never felt tired like that before. I was really sick, and also I was working on Awkward and my husband and I decided not to tell anyone until almost my 5th month. So for those first 3 months, I was on set working sick as a dog, and going back to my trailer. There were moments in the middle of the scene where I was like, this is disgusting, but I would puke in my month.

K: (Laughs) I think we've all done that.

N: I got to figure out how to swallow it before I say my next line.

K: That's hilarious. And how do you stay a hot momma? You are so fit and you just gave birth. It's not fair.

Nt I was very, very lucky with this, I'm a homible eater-I'll eat a kale salad if it's in front of me and if it's easy to get to, but if it's not, I'm gorma get something that's easy and it might be chicken nuggets. I have to work on that because I want my son to have healthy cating habits. I think a lot of it had to do with the fact that I was very much in shape before I got pregnant. As soon as I felt good enough to be upright, I put him in the stroller and started walking around. If I can get home and there's an hour of daylight I put him in the stroller and go for a walk, and we just stroll. It's good for the mind and body.

K: Most memorable experiences so far with Hudson, Everyday, right?

Ne Everyday, and I have this specific one when he was just born. He has colic and when you are on a 3 to 6 week boby bender where the baby with colic cries all day long, you're beyond yourself. It was in the middle of the night and I was breastfeeding him, and I was just sobbing. I was so tired and overwhelmed. After I finished feeding him, I was holding him for a second upright, for at least 20 to 30 minutes afterwards. He just grinned from ear to ear, it was the first time he smiled. I just remembered my heart melting, and at that moment I didn't remember the last 3 weeks and how tired and overwhelmed I was. I went on that high through the next couple of weeks.

K: Did you plan to have a baby? What was your reaction when you found out you were expecting?

Ne It's so strange, the whole journey, because I was always kind of on the fence about having habies. And then my sister had her bubies and I fell in love with my nieces, and it of course softened me to the idea. All of a sudden, one day I was like, I'm ready for a buby. I could feel this little spirit wanting to be born. It sounds so weird, but I could feel his energy. I knew it was a boy, I knew he wanted to be born in Jamuary. I said to my hmband, let's start trying in Jamuary. Of course the practical mesaid, listen, it could take a while. A lot of my friends are having a hard time, but I think we should start trying. I'm old enough, and right out of the gate, I got pregnant. I mean the very first time.

K: He's really for you. He was heaven sent.

Ne Exactly, I knew that I could feel it and he was ready but I didn't know it would be the first time, and, so when I took that pregnancy test I really wasn't that shocked. Now, my husband was so shocked. He kind of just gave me a little pat on the back and went and crawled into bed. I sat on the couch and got angry, like, that's it? I go and sit in the back and say, "I just told you that I'm pregnant." And he was like, "I know babe, I know,"

K: That's a lot to take in.

Nt Yeah, and he was shocked actually for the next 5 months, I would say. And then about month 6 he really started coming around. (Laughs)

K: It's so furny how men react so differently. I know it's very early but what scares you the most about having a son? Like, the bullying, fighting...

Ne I would say not being able to understand his journey at times. Being a woman you'll know

if your daughter is having boy trouble having her period, or is insecure or whatever it maybe—I can lock into that because I know where she's coming from.

K: It's just different with a boy.

No. I wanna feel locked in to that. I know I won't be able to in the way that my husband will. But I want to be able to kind of lock into that with him and really, really be able to understand him. And I also think sometimes boys could be so daring and wild, and sometimes not think about the consequences of their actions. That also scares me.

K: What's in your mommy purse/diaper bag that you can't leave home without?

N: Diapers, wipes, Aden + Anais swaddle blanket...they have so many uses. 10 extra bibs because I can't stand a dirty bib, an extra outfit for accidents, Hyland's teething tablets, Wuhhamab pacifier, Sophie the Giraffe [teething toy], sunscreen, haby food, and a bottle.

K: How do you manage your schedule with a baby in tow?

N: First, I could not do it without my

manny, Minsi. She is my everything. We work really long hours on the show. I don't think I would be able to function without knowing that my child is in the hest hands possible. Even still, I have meltdowns when I can't make it home in time to put him to bed. Organization and thinking ahead is also critical. I set alarms on my phone to remind me to do anything and everything-from picking up diapers to rescheduling his pediatrician appointment. At the end of the day, I remind myself that I did my best. You never cross everything off your list and some area of your life always gets neglected. Usually, it's the gym for me-but if I spend that extra hour with my baby rather than at the gym, I am a much happier human. He is my priority, not my abs.

K: Virtues you will instill in Hudson.

N: I am a big believer in kindness. Treat others the way you would like to be treated. I also love a person with manners. Others high on the list are generosity, humility, confidence, commitment, gratitude, forgiveness, and of course love...of yourself and others.

Nikki DeLoach started acting when she was just a kid. She has been involved in performing as a whole; producing, acting and stage productions. She became interested in acting when she was in *The Mickey Mouse Club*. Since then she has had roles including Lacey Hamilton on the TV series *Awkward*, and Natalie on the Hallmark movie *Truly, Madly, Sweetly*.

In her new film, she plays the main character, Natalie who dreams of owning her own bakery one day. In the beginning, she owns her own cupcake food truck but is given a chance to see her dreams come true.

"Natalie is a dreamer and a baker. We meet her at a time in her life where she is starting over – after her boyfriend not only broke her heart but stole all of her recipes and told the world they were his. She meets Dylan Neal's character when they inherit a bakery together through her mentor Bea, who just so happens to be his aunt. He wants to sell the bakery, while Natalie wants to preserve her mentor's memory and also make her dream of owning a bakery come true," DeLoach says.

"It's a story about not giving up on your dreams. It's also a story about taking a leap of faith and learning to trust again. I think



that's something everyone can relate to. Also, this is one of the sweetest Hallmark movies I've done. There's lots of comedy and Dylan and I truly are great partners. Doing this movie with him was pure joy."

When she originally started performing she was involved in dancing, singing and acting. She started acting in commercials, stage performances and then landed a spot on *The Mickey Mouse Club*.

"It wasn't until I did *The Mickey Mouse Club*, that I really took an interest in acting. MMC started to produce a teen drama called *Emerald Cove*, and I was asked to be a part of it. I absolutely loved it," DeLoach says. "In terms of being a performer, I knew I wanted to do that at the age of 3. It seems young, but when you know you know. I first asked for dance lessons, then voice lessons, then acting. I couldn't get enough. I absolutely love being a storyteller. It is one of the great joys of my life and that feeling has only grown over the years," DeLoach says.

In addition to acting in this film, DeLoach signed a development deal with Hallmark to produce a Christmas film, *Reunited at Christmas*. She will also be playing the main character, Samantha who reconnects with her family for Christmas because of a tragedy.

"It's about a family who hasn't been together in years over the holidays. When the matriarch of the family, Nana Madaline, passes away, she leaves behind a dying wish which was that the whole family spend one last Christmas together, in her house, doing all the traditions they used to," DeLoach says. "The family is reunited, but it's quite the journey for them to get there. It's a beautiful story with so much heart."

DeLoach explained what it was like to produce and act in this film rather than just work one role. She was able to be involved in her

"It's been fantastic. I love the entire process of bringing a story to life. From the original idea, to development, the script, casting, set design, costumes, music – all of it," DeLoach says. "It's the way I've always wanting to work in this business. I'm so grateful to Hallmark for saying yes to the project and for making it happen."

Having done both television and film acting DeLoach has seen both sides of the spectrum. She says that she enjoys each of them but for different reasons.

"I love the consistency of being on a show. I love that you get to take a character in so many different directions. In a movie, you are telling one story. On a TV series, especially if it goes for several seasons, you have the opportunity to tell many stories," DeLoach says. "With that being said, I love the balance that doing movies gives me in my personal life. I do a movie for a month and then I get to be home with my family until the next. And that is quite nice. There are pros in both and I'm so fortunate to be able to work in both worlds."

In her free time, she is one of the founders and writers for the blog, 'What We Are'. She started the blog with her friend Jen Dede to help support and connect with other women. The blog highlights the stories of all kinds of women which can be seen @welcometowhatweare on Instagram and Twitter. She encourages those who want their story to be heard to reach out.

"My dear friend Jen Dede and I have been wanting to start "What We Are" for years. It really stemmed from a place of wanting to live a truly authentic life. To be real at every moment with where we are and who we are – which meant embracing the sometimes messy, scary, and truth. We believe that vulnerability is a superpower. And by being vulnerable and open, you can truly connect to others. Plus, we are so lucky to be surrounded by so many incredible women! Women are amazing! I mean, really. We do ALL the things! So, we really wanted to tell those stories." DeLoach says.

"No one knows what it's like to be a woman like another woman. I look at the women around me in complete awe of their strength, grace, intellect, kindness, compassion, and fight. We have so much to give and the world can greatly benefit from our gifts. Things are absolutely changing for the better for women and I'm so thrilled that I get to be here to witness it.... She also is the spokesperson for humanitarian organizations like The Alzheimer's Association and Children's Hospital of L.A. Children's Hospital is a nonprofit organization that seeks to help children with their medical needs. 

It's a Wednesday in Los Angeles and Nikki DeLoach is loading her kids William and Bennet into the car for a doctor's appointment. It's an almost quintessential mom moment, struggling with a car seat with a cell phone cocked under her ear. It's also a far cry from her other life as an actress, strutting the red carpet at events ranging from Elton John's Oscar Party to People StyleWatch's Annual Denim Party.

Depending on your viewing habits, you either know Nikki DeLoach as the endearingly self-centered Lacey Hamilton on MTV's "Awkward," or you know her from the slew of Hallmark movies she's recently made her specialty, including "Truly, Madly, Sweetly," "The Perfect Catch," "A Dream of Christmas" and "Reunited at Christmas."

It's a resume that means you've most certainly seen her in something. And it's almost worlds apart from the town of Blackshear, Georgia where she grew up.

"Growing up there, it was this idyllic small town, and by the way it still is," she said. "It really was such an incredible place to be raised. I feel like in these small towns... I was raised by a community. Whether it was in church or school or sports, this whole community kind of kept their eyes on you and made sure you were taken care of. Everyone kind of came together to raise everyone's children."

Landing a modeling contract at a young age following a successful run on the pageant circuit, she left the one-stoplight town of Blackshear for the bright lights of Los Angeles and New York. It eventually landed her on the All-New Mickey Mouse Club, a show that launched the careers of stars like Ryan Gosling, Britney Spears and NSYNC, Fueled by her newfound stardom, she moved to LA with her grandmother full-time in 1994.

"Because I started acting and had been there young, I had been introduced to big cities like New York and LA," she said. "But when I moved here, I think the biggest shock to the system was the size, the traffic, and it was just looking around and thinking, 'Where's the community? Where are the people that genuinely care about you as a human and not for what you can do for them or how much money you can make them?"

As she built her career, she also began building her community. Inspired by the hometown she left behind and the simple mantra, "If it doesn't exist, create it," she began cultivating a community of actors who support one another through the difficult life of being a working actor.

"We're calling ourselves the New Hollywood," she said with a laugh. "And it's made all the difference in the world. I'm just so grateful... That's something small towns do without thinking. In big cities, if you want that in your world you have to make it yourself. It's been a gamechanger for me."

She's also built a community through her writing, launching a blog with fellow writer Jen Ded called "What We Are." Billed as a community where women "of all walks of life to share unfiltered stories and experiences on various issues women face today," What We Are has built

a strong following of women who are ready to drop the Instagram filter and revel in their shared experiences.

There are some really good (stories on the site)," she said. "I love Jamie Lynn Sigler's piece on asking for help. I think that's a really big one for women. We've been told by society, and we also tell ourselves, we can do anything: go to work, take care of kids; we can do all of it. The truth of the matter is, we can't. It's hard. You're carrying the weight of the world around. And also, you have a full-time job. It's really difficult."

That theme of asking for help resonated with

DeLoach, who found herself in that position when her son Bennett was born with a heart defect that required open-heart surgery when he was just five

"I'd never had to ask for help in my life. I was one of those women who said. 'I have this.' ... What I had was strength to move forward, everything else I needed help on." She also found catharsis in writing about her father's diagnosis of Pick's disease, a form of dementia.

"I actually find out about my dad and Bennett about a week apart. The one thing I will say is I'm a huge person of faith. It's my rock, it's my foundation. I never could have gotten through what I've been through the last two years without my faith," she said. "And I could have not gotten around it without the people around me. I'm writing an article right now about angels; these are the real-life angels."


These angels, these communities DeLoach has cultivated around herself, are at heart extensions of the community in which she grew up. One where everyone made sure you were taken care of and who came together in times of need.

It's this sense of community she remembers when she talks about Blackshear, a place she still returns to as much as possible, to recharge on the family farm where she and her husband Ryan Goodell were married, and where most of her family still lives

"I just miss being on my family farm, I miss putting my feet in the grass. There's something in that soil that feeds me... Just being able to be there with my family, that's what I miss the most," she said. "I want my kids connected to earth and this specific place in the world that has meant so much to me."



A New Gig: "I wanted to learn the business side of producing. I had worked on sets for my entire life, so that part of it I knew like the back of my hand. A good friend of mine, Mickey Liddell, has a production company and I said, 'Do you mind if I come and intern? Then a month or so into it, he lost one of his head creative executives, so he asked me if I wanted to work there. It was one of the greatest learning experiences of my life. t has not been an easy professional road for Nikki DeLoach, who first found success at the young age of 12 with Disney's THE ALL NEW MICKEY MOUSE CLUB, working alongside names like Britney Spears, Ryan Gosling, Justin Timberlake, Christina Aguilera and exboyfriend J.C. Chasez from 1993-95.

"I moved out to L.A. after THE MICKEY MOUSE CLUB when I was 15 and worked for a couple of years straight," she recalls. "I did really well, actually, but it was lonely. My friends Justin Timberlake and J.C. were in Orlando doing ['NSYNC], so I was down in Orlando every other month. I was actually there the weekend they signed their record contract. I really got to see them bloom and see how much fun they were having together. Then Justin's mom, Lynn, called me in and said, 'I want to put together a girl group [later named Innosense]. Do you want to help me do it?' I just jumped at the opportunity because when else would this opportunity present itself? I knew I'd regret it if I didn't do it."

The actress admits, however, that it wasn't the experience she bargained for. "My lawyer, my agent, my manager, everybody told me, 'This is such a huge mistake and you're going to commit career suicide if you do this,' but I did it anyway. They were right. I did, in a lot of ways, commit career suicide," DeLoach laughs in retrospect. "Signing with [manager] Lou Pearlman ended up being a disaster, I mean, he's in jail now! When I moved back out to L.A., I still had two years left on the record contract that I had to live out or else Pearlman would have gotten a piece of everything that I did. So, I went to community college [for two years], I was completely broke, had nothing and had to start all over."

And start over she did when she landed the role of Mary on

FOX's short-lived series NORTH SHORE in 2004. "It was one of the best working experiences I've ever had in my life," she beams. "NORTH SHORE was such a special thing. To be in Hawaii, which is one of my favorite places on Earth, was amazing. I did not experience island fever. People are running around with ukeleles and dancing and laughing and gambling behind the bushes. I did not want to come back. And even if it was just for a year, I'm so lucky to have been able to have the opportunity."

After a string of other prime-time appearances on shows like CSI: NY, COLD CASE and WITHOUT A TRACE, DeLoach landed her first daytime role in 2009 as DAYS OF OUR LIVES's Brenda, one of Ciara Brady's kidnappers. "Well, I have to make it known that I'm a huge soap opera fan," DeLoach smiles. "I grew up with my grandfather and my grandmother watching [soaps], so I still record Y&R every day! [Working on] DAYS just made me admire the actors that are doing soap work. It isn't easy and that is a skill set that you don't often get to learn as an actor. From being such a soap opera fan, it was really cool to actually be on a soap opera. It was altogether a great experience. Jay Kenneth Johnson [ex-Philip] and I worked on NORTH SHORE, so I got to see him whenever I was on DAYS and it was really fun to catch up and say hi because we all spent a year together in Hawaii."

DeLoach continued to audition for other shows and even filmed a couple of movies along the way, like Love & Other Drugs with Anne Hathaway and Jake Gyllenhaal and Answer to Nothing with Dane Cook, but it wasn't until she landed the role of Lacey on MTV's AWKWARD that she felt she struck gold, both personally and professionally. "I hit the jackpot as an actor," she enthuses. "I remember the first time I read the pilot script, I just instantly knew how special it was.

Whether or not an audience would find it, because you never know, [was the question]. And you never know, even if they do find it, if it's going to click."

The third season premiered last month, and the show has officially hit its stride, becoming Tuesday night's "most social television program" in the 12-34 demographic, according to www.tvbythenumbers.zap2it.com. "We're telling stories that are real and that are happening right now. We don't preach to the kids, we don't talk above kids. We talk right on their level and the show isn't an after-school special, where the music comes in at the end and there's this big lesson learned. There's always a lesson to be learned in AWKWARD, however, it is found just by telling the story. The audience finds their own message."

After watching Lacey go through some highs and lows in the past couple of seasons, DeLoach is excited to try something new with her alter ego. "In season three, Lacey is really trying to focus on being the best mom she can be. This is a Lacey we've never seen before. The first 10 episodes are really showing the new relationship between Jenna and Lacey. But then in the back end [of the season], we really start to see the whole family dynamic struggle a bit as Jenna goes through a lot of changes. The audience will see Jenna unlike they've ever seen her before."

While filming AWKWARD, the actress also received her degree in both psychology and English from the University of Maryland. "It took so long and it's one of my proudest accomplishments because I was working full time while I was getting my degree, so every vacation I was on a beach with a psych book in my hand, trying to find wireless Intemet in Starbucks so I could do my schoolwork online."


Although she currently has plenty to keep her busy, DeLoach is always open for a return to daytime. "I'm just throwing it out there that if Y&R wants me to come on, I'm available after June — that's when we'll wrap AWKWARD. "The show wouldn't be what it is without our audience."

With "Awkward" on midseason hintus, DeLoach showed another part of her range with a May guest ap-pearance on "CSL" She says she was welcomed by the crew of the long-running TV crime drama.

Nikki DeLoach, born in a small town in South Georgia, always knew she wanted to be an entertainer. She started dancing at the age of three, eventually adding singing, modeling, and acting to her repertoire. All her hard work paid off when, at the age of 12, she became a member of The Mickey Mouse Club (MMC), alongside Justin Timberlake, Britney Spears, Christina Aguilera, and Ryan Gosling. After MMC, DeLoach spent several years in Los Angeles pursuing acting. She landed a starring role opposite Mark Wahlberg and Bill Paxton in the feature film Traveller, and the TV series Misery Loves Company. She also played Anthony LaPaglia's daughter in the television movie Never Give Up: The Jimmy V Story. In 1997, DeLoach put her acting career on hold to enter the world of pop music, signing with RCA and BMG Records to become part of the girl group Innosense. When the group disbanded in 2003, DeLoach returned to Hollywood, enjoying a successful and diverse acting career.

DeLoach's recent credits include her starring role on MTV's critically acclaimed series, Awkward, where she was considered one of television's "hottest moms" as Lacey Hamilton. DeLoach also guest starred on some of TV's biggest hit shows, including NCIS, Criminal Minds, CSI, CSI: NY, Cold Case, Mad Men and Without a Trace, among many others. She was also a series regular on the popular show North Shore. Her films include Love & Other Drugs, Flying Lessons, opposite Maggie Grace and Hal Holbrook, and the French cornedy Hollywood.

RAINE: Can you describe your experiences and how they helped fine-tune your craft?

DELOACH: I would say that everything I've experienced in my life helped me fine-tune my craft. You learn something new at every job you say yes to. However, there were a few experiences that really helped me take it to the next level. The Mickey Mouse

Club gave me a strong education and foundation for DELOACH: Vision/creativity, leadership, work ethic. any creative path I want to explore, whether that be acting music, writing or directing It also taught me a lot about having a good work ethic, being a team player, and how the work should feel when you are doing it. Something else that became a game changer for me was becoming a teacher. I started teaching acting at Warner Loughlin Studios when I was 29. I had fallen in love with Warner's technique and had been a student there for many years. When you are responsible for teaching others, you really start to own your skill set. Do things that bring you joy, pleasure, and adventure. Do things for others. Being a person of service and giving back is one of my favorite ways of kickstarting my creativity.

RAINE Have you ever faced the issue of burnout in your career? If so, how did you overcome it?

DELOACH: YES! Sometimes the pursuit of your dreams wears you down. At that point, it's time to take a beat and heal your creative wound. I really believe it's easier to overcome these moments when you have a full life outside of the thing you are in pursuit of. I have kids, my husband, family, and friends. I work with Children's Hospital of Los Angeles and The Alzheimer's Association I teach I write. I cofounded a site for women called What We Are. DELOACH: I wanted to be a storyteller. I thank God every day that I grew up to do the thing that I love. It has been a very long road Lots of Ramen Noodles. Seriously, I wake up every day and give thanks that I get to pay my bills doing the thing that I dreamed about as a child.

RAINE What major project coming up are you most excited about?

DELOACH: I have another wonderful Christmas movie called Two Turtle Doves that I did for Hallmark coming out later this year. So stay tuned for that.

RAINE: What three traits do you feel are most RAINE Who have been the most memorable people you have worked alongside and why?

DELOACH: My teacher on The Mickey Mouse Club. Mr. Chuck Yerger, was one of the most influential people in my life. He could make any subject exciting. RAINE Talk about how technology changed your industry for newcomers?

DELOACH: I think that it greatly changed my industry in a positive as well as negative way. How many followers people have on Instagram actually influences casting decisions, which is bananas, I am a purist in the sense that I feel like you should hire the best person for the job, and I say that as a producer as well. The way in which technology has positively impacted our industry is that there are so many different and more varied ways for people to produce content. If you have an iPhone and an idea, you can create something. I love that. It removes the "gate keepers"—the people who usually decide if you get an opportunity to bring something to life.

RAINE Are there any plans to partner with a major celebrity, brand or organization in the future? DELOACH: Right now, I just want to be the spokesperson for OxiClean. I have two kids. OxiClean is life. I really feel like they need to make my family the face of the brand. I don't know anyone messier than my family.

RAINE What is the biggest problem that creatives face today and how would you solve it?

DELOACH: People see something that was successful and try to do the same thing hoping to be just as successful. Why not do something different? Just like each and every human being is different, every creative idea is different—it has a pulse.

It was a dream come true. I was a kid who was getting to do what I loved to do most in the world. The show was such a gift and truly the most incredible training ground for anything I would ever want to do in the entertainment industry. I was also surrounded by peers who felt the same way in regards to their love of performing. Yes, Justin was one of those peers. He is a very private person and we wouldn't be friends as long as we have if I was a person who dished on my friends. I will just say that I am so proud of all that he has accomplished. He is one of the most hard-working people I know. Oh, and buy his new album. It's fantastic.

You started out in the Mickey Mouse Club, and then you went to LA to try acting but ended up in a girl group. How did that happen and how did you make your way back to acting?

I was actually working a lot when I first moved out to L.A. after the MMC. I was 15 years old and very fortunate. When Lynn Harless (Justin's mom) called to ask if I wanted to start a girl group with her, the dreamer in me screamed "YES!" I missed music and felt like if I didn't take advantage of the opportunity I would always regret it. Plus, I was seeing what Justin and J.C. were doing with "NSYNC and a big part of me wanted to be involved in something like that. My reps said I was making a huge mistake with my acting career taking off the way it was. They were right in so many ways. However, I met my husband while in the music business. So, as hard as that experience was, it was worth it because of him. I knew I would always go back to acting because I loved it so much. After the music business, I moved back out to L.A. and started over.

Being that you can sing, will there be a musical project in the future or have you put that behind you completely?

I would love to do music again. It would have to be in the most organic way...a role in a movie or a TV show that involves singing, a stage musical, or sitting down with friends and becoming inspired to play together. I would actually give anything to do a musical! I have been in love with them since I was a child. I am obsessed.

You currently play Lacey Hamilton on the hit MTV series, Awkward. What appealed to you most about Lacey?

She is actually a very complicated, nuanced character. Yes, she is outrageous, self-centered, and incredibly inappropriate at times. Ultimately, though, Lacey is like every other mother out there...she loves and wants the best for her kid. Her heart is always in the right place. Lacey's skill set, however, is under-developed. Honestly, this character scared me so much when I first read the pilot, not only because of her complexity, but because she is so vastly different from myself. However, I had been yearning for a challenge. She carne along at the perfect time.

What can the fans expect in the new season of Awkward? Will Lacey and Kevin stay together or do they have more obstacles coming up?

Lacey and Kevin are as strong as ever. They will have to be because Jenna really deals with some heavy issues in Season 3 and will need her parents. That is all I can give away I am afraid. I hate when Lacey and Kevin fight. However, they are very, very good at making up...if you are picking up what I am putting down.

You have a big fan base, how important is it for you to stay connected with your fans on Twitter and other social media platforms?

It is incredibly important to stay connected with fans on social media. Let's use Awkward as an example of the power of social media via fans. Our audience found the show and made it a success. We all felt like the show was great, but that doesn't always translate to ratings. We would live tweet every episode and try to respond to every fan tweet or Facebook message possible. Our fans spread the word about Awkward... along with the critics. They can make or break you, and luckily, they made us. We are so grateful to our fans and the critics for their passionate use of social media on behalf of our little engine that could.

We look forward to the new season of Awkward, can you tell us what other projects you have coming up?

I just wrapped a short where I am playing opposite Willem Defoe. Kevin Spacey's production company Trigger Street Productions is producing it. I will be pinching myself for a long time after getting to work with Willem. He is truly the most wonderful actor and person. I also did a movie called HUNTED, in January, right before Season 3 began shooting. It is a horror movie with a very unique premise. I worked opposite Josh Stewart who is a dream—a good-ole country boy with a heck-of-a-lot of talent. Then, I have an episode of CSI airing May 1st.

Stay grounded. Flying is A LOT of work. Especially with two kids.

What drew you to this project?

I had already heard of the story that inspired this movie. It was so beautiful and worthy of people's attention. So, to be a small part of that was a big YES for me. Secondly, to have the opportunity to be a part of a Hallmark Hall of Fame movie is something I would never pass up. It is a real honor. Hallmark Hall of Fame is the most award-winning and longest-running series in the history of television. Then, to find out that my dear friend **Steven Monroe** was directing this was so exciting. We've done five movies together, but never a Hall of Fame. It was a real treat to share this with him and also the incomparable **Barbara Niven**, who I truly love.

The film takes place and filmed in Savannah, Georgia and you were born in Georgia. Can you give me memory of growing up in Georgia? Or something that reminds you of Georgia?

I love how real that is and it speaks to a huge percentage of women who also feel that way. I also loved that she's a writer, a storyteller. It teaches us how to love and be compassionate and have empathy for others.



I also liked how the movie depicts the importance of multigenerational relationships.

That was such a big thing for me. When I pitched this idea, I wanted to have an ensemble cast and for them to be highlighted, not just the man and woman falling in love. I felt it was really important because it speaks to the entire family. There's somebody for everybody to relate to.

The cast was really excited as well because they usually only get a sentence here or a word there. They're [usually] in service of that lead story line and now they get their own story lines.

The mother and father story line is actually my favorite of the movie. I love that they are two people who did get divorced and now they're kind of being brought back together. What does it look like when a family's gone through that? What does it look like to reimagine what the holidays could be?

Was it hard to film those proposal rejection scenes?

Yes! Because you have to be specific about the tone. You can't have the audience hate you, so you have to be authentic and do it with a lot of heart and a lot of love.


The Christmas decorating in this movie is next level. How long did it take to decorate the main home featured?

Ever since I can remember, my family has eaten this sweet potato casserole recipe every Thanksgiving and Christmas. It wouldn't be the holidays without it! I love the combination of sweet and salty, fluffy and crunchy. My entire family lives on our family farm in South Georgia. Each house is nestled between its own pecan orchard. There is something so special about farm to table. I have so many great memories of picking up pecans with my dad. The experience just makes each and every bite more delicious.

Ingredients

- 6 sweet potatoes
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup milk (2% or whole)
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 to 1 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1/3 cup self-rising flour
- 1/3 cup melted margarine for topping

How to Make It

Step 1 Bake the sweet potatoes at 400 degrees until tender. (About one hour) Let cool. Remove skins

Step 2 Mash the sweet potatoes and mix with sugar, eggs, vanilla, milk, margarine. Place in a buttered casserole dish.

Step 3 For topping, mix brown sugar, pecans, flour, and melted margarine together and sprinkle evenly on top of the sweet potato mixture.

Step 4 Bake casserole at 350 degrees for approximately 30 minutes or until nicely browned.

But when the mother-of-two signed up for Hallmark's *Love Takes Flight*, she was actually about as close to her loved ones as she could get. The movie, which premieres on Saturday, April 27, was filmed in Savannah, Georgia, and is very close to where the Hallmark star grew up.

"I was born and raised about an hour and a half from Savannah, in a small town called Blackshear, Georgia. And my family still lives there, they all live on a farm," Nikki tells *CountryLiving.com* in an exclusive interview. Nikki, who plays OB-GYN turned COO Dr. Lizzie Beauman, says her relatives were even able to visit while she was on set. "I really got in some family time, which was amazing. Absolutely amazing," she says.

Interestingly enough, *Love Takes Flight* was not only filmed in the southern city, but it actually takes place in the Hostess City of the South. Inspired by a true story, the movie shows the life of Lizzie, a divorced single parent who goes from friendly to falling head-over-heels for Charley Allen, (played by actor Jeff Hephner) the new EMS pilot at St. Carmen's Hospital where she works.

Georgians will definitely recognize a handful of places featured in the film, including the quaint Savannah Historic District that "is the heart of one of the most beautiful cities in the world," according to the website. Viewers will also get to see the breathtaking Wormsloe Historic Site, which was once the estate of Noble Jones, one of Georgia's colonial founders.



Like most Hallmark movies, *Love Takes Flight* is a story about love—but there's much more to the narrative than that, Nikki notes. "It's a really beautiful story. It's got a lot of nuance to it. It's bigger than just a romance," she says. "I really hope people like it."

And we're sure they will! Tune into watch Nikki in *Love Takes Flight* Saturday, April 27 at 9 p.m. EST on Hallmark.

The following Career Dispatches essay was written by Nikki DeLoach, previously of MTV's "Awkward" and who can currently be seen starring in the Hallmark Hall of Fame movie "Love Takes Flight."

Be prepared.

Be the hardest working person in the room.

Stay humble.

Don't take rejection personally.

Have fun.

Throw your sides in the trash after an audition.

Protect your artistic self.	
Get in class.	
Keep going.	
Don't give up.	
NEVER give up!	

Be kind to the crew, not just to those above the line.

These are all pieces of advice I've received and also given as a teacher at Warner Loughlin Studios and UCLA. I am often asked to provide words of wisdom to other artists, especially newbies. And the truth is, I have a lot of wisdom to share! I better. I've survived this industry for over 30 years. I've failed more times than I can even count. I've made a lot of mistakes. I sure hope I've learned a thing or two or three or 100. What I would love to share with you today, though, is something that no one told me in the beginning—or for that matter, even five years ago.

This business is not the end all, be all.


Seems simple enough, right? Except for the fact that we often let our acting careers define who we are, determine our self-worth, arbitrate our happiness, and compromise our integrity. Sound familiar? We do all kinds of crazy, unhealthy things to ourselves in the name of "being an artist," and it's not OK. Such practices also have nothing to do with being an artist.

I spent the majority of my life being tethered to (in the words of Amy Poehler's "Yes, Please") a "bad boyfriend." Poehler explains in her book that this industry is like a bad boyfriend who you give your everything to and in exchange, he doesn't call or text back, he sees other women and men, and then he dumps you for the hotter, younger version of yourself. When I read this, it felt like I had finally heard someone articulate what it sometimes feels like to be an actor in a relationship with Hollywood.

So, how do we proceed? I'm not saying we dump our "bad boyfriend." Poehler didn't! I didn't! And you shouldn't, either—unless you really want to, then by all means. (I would recommend a Jerry Maguire–style exit; always seemed like a fun idea.)

Instead, I suggest you gain perspective and always, *always* take care of yourself. As hard as you work to grow your artist self, you should be working equally as hard on your human self. In my opinion, they are one and the same, but we often devote every second of our being to acting class, auditioning, trying to get auditions, complaining that we can't get auditions, meeting with agents and managers, trying to get an agent or manager, complaining that we can't get an agent or manager, and so on and so on. What we sometimes forget along the way is the person who was worthy long before the dream of becoming an actor was born and the person who will still be worthy long after the dream of becoming an actor has been achieved.

For me, the rollercoaster finally became too much. I wanted to be an actor, but I also wanted to be happy, so I had to make a decision. Either I was going to leave the industry completely, stay in it and continue down this toxic path, or stay in it with some amendments to my relationship. I chose option No. 3. I decided that I wasn't going to allow something that brought me great joy and fulfillment to be taken away from me because I was unable to take control of my reaction to it.



I brought other elements into my life that allowed me to live outside of the often all-consuming world of Hollywood. I finished my college degree. I began teaching. I volunteered with organizations I cared about. I started a family. Eventually, my spirit was being filled up by the life I was living which, in turn, freed me up to be a better artist.

I also had to learn how to stay open. True openness doesn't mean allowing people to walk all over you or saying "yes" when you really mean "no." When you are really open, you can actually feel what your higher self is aligned to. You can feel into what is going to make your heart soar as opposed to break. It is only through opening ourselves up that we are able to navigate the often murky waters of this industry with both caution and curiosity, discernment and delight. Knowing the difference takes knowing oneself; it takes openness.

By placing just as much importance on developing positive self-worth, self-love, strong personal boundaries, and creating a supportive and loving community around you, you will not only be able to navigate your experience in this industry in a more healthy way, you will be doing something for the whole self. You see, it is not only our job as a human being to be on the path to becoming the best version of ourselves; it is also our job to serve. When we do better, the whole does better. When we rise, others rise with us. My entire relationship with this business has never been better. When you no longer allow this industry to define you or determine your happiness or self-worth, it frees you up to play again.

A wise man (otherwise known as my ear, nose, and throat doctor) once said to me, "Intelligence is learning from your own mistakes. Genius is learning from the mistakes of others." So, to all you geniuses out there, please learn from mine!



GET TO KNOW NIKKI DELOACH: STAR OF THE NEW HALLMARK CHRISTMAS MOVIE REUNITED AT CHRISTMAS



Writer, producer and mother, Nikki DeLoach, is known for playing Lacey Hamilton in the critically-acclaimed series of *Awkward* for five seasons. Your latest film, Truly, Madly, Sweetly just premiered! This was your first job after having your second child. How was it getting back into working?

It was both excruciatingly difficult and full of joy and fulfilling. Which I think is probably a perfect analogy to life, right? My second pregnancy was complicated, and the birth of my child was nothing short of traumatizing as he was born with a heart defect and had to undergo open heart surgery at 5 days old. He came home on oxygen for 6 months. I went back to work after he had come off oxygen, so leaving him to go back to work was extremely hard. However, it was also great to be able to do what I love to do while being surrounded by the loveliest humans on set. It was a much-needed break in what had been the most difficult year of my life to this point.

How is life being a Mother of two?

Hudson was the most wonderful, life-changing, heart opening thing I've ever done in my life. Bennett was the second. The two of them together make up my heart. Parenting two is equal parts, exhausting and exhilarating, maddening and jubilant. Being a mom is the most important thing I've ever done in my life. At the same time, it is hard. There's not two of me, which is complicated when they both need you at the exact same time. However, one of the things that the last year taught me after our sweet addition, is that I can do anything. I am stronger than I ever thought I could be.

You are going to be a part of Hallmark Movies' Miracles of Christmas – Reunited at Christmas. Can you tell us a little bit about this project?

Gladly! It's about a family that hasn't been together over the holidays for a long time. When the matriarch, Nana Madaline, passes away, she leaves behind a wish— for the whole family to spend one last Christmas together in the house they always stayed in over the holidays. It's a true ensemble movie. This was very important to me. I wanted a family's story to be told, and I really think it will resonate with our audience.

At the age of 12 you joined The Mickey Mouse Club, alongside Ryan Gosling, Britney Spears and Christina Aguilera, to name a few. What do you remember about this time? Are you still in contact with any of your fellow club members?

I remember this time in my life as being exciting, fulfilling, full of fun and happy memories. This was a place where I was surrounded by peers— kids that had the same interests as me. So, in a

way, I felt like I had found a home. It was also a place where I could learn and grow as an artist. It was like the best performing arts school ever created. I am still friends with a handful of my cast mates. It's so nice because we went through something that very few people have experienced being on that show. It's an exclusive club and I am so grateful that I got to be a part of it.

One of your most popular roles has to be Lacey Hamilton on Awkward. Are there any similarities between yourself and Lacey after playing her for quite some time?

Haha! Yes, there were similarities. Like Lacey, I have the best of intentions, I love my children more than anything else in this world. I had a complicated relationship with my mother, and I grew up in a place in the world where personal esthetics were overvalued. With that being said, I've never been so different from a character. Lacey and I were so opposite in so many ways. Especially in the execution of those foundational shared characteristics. I could never imagine telling my daughter to get a good job to help with her popularity! I miss playing her so much.

You are strongly involved in empowering women! Can you tell us a bit about your blog: "What We Are", how it started and where the inspirations came from?

I think women are the bravest, strongest, most incredible beings. Every woman in my life is so inspiring. "What We Are" is certainly a labor of love that I also feel is really important. My cofounder, Jen Dede, and I became friends many years ago at a time in our lives where living inauthentically simply wasn't an option anymore. We wanted to do the work to love ourselves unconditionally— the good, the sad, and the very, very messy. And we wanted to have the type of friendship that reflected that which meant being vulnerable and open about who we are and where we are in life. It was amazing! And then we began encouraging that in all our friendships, and now we belong to this beautiful community of women who all show up as is and are supported and loved. We wanted to create a space in the world where women everywhere could feel into that— a place where they could be their beautifully unfiltered selves and be celebrated for it.

You're always so busy with your career! What can we expect to see from you next?

Besides "Reunited at Christmas" and "What We Are" I am back in developing mode— writing and producing. So, hopefully lots of great things soon. I also am a spokesperson for "The Alzheimer's Association" and "Children's Hospital of Los Angeles." This is something I am very dedicated to and fills up a lot of my time.

Here at BELLA our tagline is Beauty Defined by You. Can you tell us what beauty means to you?

My dear friend Madaline tells me that it is not our job to move through life being positive, instead it is our job to move through life being open. It's true—without being open we miss out on all the good stuff, on everything that matters. So, that's my answer... being open.

There's a difference in all of the characters that I play. Not one character has ever been the same. Lacey Hamilton on *Awkward*. was most certainly one of a kind.

Can you tell us about your new star-studded Hallmark film, *Two Turtle Doves*? And are there any other projects you have coming up that you are excited about?

Yes! First and foremost, the team that I got to work with on *Two Turtle Doves* was such a blessing. When I went through what I did with my youngest son's heart condition and my father's dementia, it changed me forever. I realized that my purpose is much bigger than any job or any role I could ever have. It's to leave the world better than when I came into it and I get to accomplish that with What We Are and with my work with the Children's Hospital of Los Angeles and the Alzheimer's Association.

Your journey to spread awareness doesn't stop there; you're also a strong proponent for education and a budding philanthropist- how do you manage to juggle it all?

I'm very organized. I create space for everything that matters to me first and then insert my work around that if possible. When I'm on set filming, it's hard to make room for anything else. However, the second I leave set, I'm in control of my schedule and seek to be really cognizant of my time, which includes time for myself. Self-care has been a very tough lesson this year, but one that is necessary. I also have a lot of help.

What does the future look like for Nikki DeLoach?

I have no clue. Every time I thought my life was going in a certain direction, God would surprise me and the direction would shift. I'm trying to stay open to whatever comes my way, without expectation, and follow the things in my life that fulfill me personally and professionally. I plan to keep showing up in places where I can be of service.

ELYSIAN'S 22 QUESTIONS WITH NIKKI DELOACH



Q: What is one thing you can't live without?

A: My kids.

Q: Why is it important for women to support women?

A: At the end of the day, I feel like when one of us rises, we all rise together. If history has proven anything, if women don't lift each other, no one else will.

A rising tide floats all boats!

Q: If you could spend the day with anyone living or dead, who would it be and why?

A: I'd spend one last day with my grandfather who passed away almost five years ago.

Q: What has been the most rewarding project of your career?

A: In terms of acting, I'm really proud of the work I did on Awkward and really proud of the show that we made. In my personal life, I'm extremely proud of the work that I've done and continue to do with the Children's Hospital of Los Angeles and the Alzheimer's Association.

Q: When were you happiest?

A: Now. My youngest son currently has a healthy heart. Both of my kids are thriving. My husband and I are fortunate enough to still be together after 20 years. We have great jobs, a roof over our heads and we are surrounded by incredible family and friends.

Q: What is the worst job you've done?

A: After the first season of Awkward was filmed, I was interning at a production company because I wanted to learn the business side. They started me by answering phones and I couldn't figure out how to use them, so they took me off and had me just read scripts instead. It wasn't the worst job I've ever had but the most incompetent I've ever been in my life.

Q: Where is one place in the world you would love to visit next?

A: Africa

Q: How do you relax?

A: I love to take baths while watching TV on my iPad.

Q: What is your daily skincare routine?

A: I use products from Dr. Lancer, a dermatologist in Los Angeles. It's a whole regimen that takes about 10 minutes in the morning and 20 minutes at night. It involves exfoliating, cleansing, spraying, applying and more applying. I just started using the products and I can already see a huge difference in my face.

Q: What is your most cherished beauty product?

A: Dry shampoo, sunscreen and Aquaphor.

Q: Favorite accessory and why?

A: I have a necklace that was made by my friend Monica Stanley at Leenabell. She makes bar necklaces and I have my sons' names engraved on each side. I never take it off.

0: What is your favorite high-end brand to splurge on?

A: My face products by Dr. Lancer. I don't really splurge on anything else.

Q: What is the biggest misconception about your profession?

A: That it's always glamorous and just because you're an actor, you're always successful. Only 5% of actors make enough money to not have a second job, so it's an extraordinarily tough profession. There are people in the industry that present themselves as if they're more important because of what they do for a living, but that's not true. No matter what job you have, everyone is equal.

Q: Which words or phrases do you most overuse?

A: I recently listened to several podcasts that I was a guest on and for an academic, it was astounding and horrifying how many times I used the words "like" and "um". I'm trying to be more cognizant.

Q: What trait do you most admire in others?

A: Kindness.

Q: Who would play you in the film of your life?

A: If it was a movie about my childhood, Michaela Russell. If it was about my 20's, Kaitlyn Dever and Brie Larson for my 30s.

Q: How would you like to be remembered?

A: I would like to be remembered as a person who loved hard, a great mom, a great wife, a great friend and a person with a service driven heart. A person that left the world better than she came into it.

Q: Is there a specific film or actor that inspired you to act?

A: Yes, "Singing in the Rain" and Barbra Streisand in "Funny Girl".

Q: Why did you start the What We Are blog? And can you discuss why vulnerability is our superpower?

A: Jen Dede, What We Are co-founder, kind of walked into my life at that point in time where I was like, 'I want to wake up and I want to be the most authentic version of myself. And I don't care if it's messy and I don't care if it's ugly. And I don't care if my messiness makes people uncomfortable.' This is important. This is important to living a good life." From this revelation, we founded What We Are. It started as a hobby blog has now turned into a platform and a movement for women about women.

It takes more strength to be vulnerable than it does to pretend, deny or be in resistance to your feelings. You actually can't feel your feelings without vulnerability. Only by being vulnerable can we truly learn to love and accept ourselves; and love and accept others. Only through vulnerability can we live an authentic life.

Q: Who's an actor or director that you would love to work with?

A: I would love to work with Diane Keaton, Allison Janney, Holly Hunter, Julianne Moore and the list goes on. As far as directors, Steven Spielberg and Greta Gerwig.

Q: Can you tell us about your work with The Alzheimer's Association? How did you first get involved and what it means to you.

A: I first got involved when my father was diagnosed with Pick's disease, a very rare and aggressive form of dementia in the summer of 2017. I also lost my grandfather to Alzheimer's and my father's mother also has it. I'm a big believer in turning your pain into purpose and living a life of service, so it made perfect sense for me to get involved with the organization based on how dramatically it has impacted my family. It's the 6th leading cause of death in the US and every 65 seconds, someone is diagnosed. It is a disease that needs our awareness, our help and our money.

Q: Do you have any upcoming projects with Hallmark that you can tell us about?

A: Right now, "Two Turtle Doves" is airing on the Hallmark Movies & Mysteries Channel, which will be playing throughout the holidays. I'm currently in development on a three other projects for 2020.



Nikki DeLoach stars in the upcoming movie *Two Turtle Doves*, premiering **November 1st** on Hallmark Movies & Mysteries — and she's shared some of her top tools with us! Nikki is also the cofounder of *What We Are*, a blog community that aims to unite women and give them a platform to share common experiences on issues they are facing today.

What was your inspiration for starting your blog, What We Are?

My bestie Jen Dede and I became friends at a time in our lives where we were tired of pretending that everything was great! You know what I'm talking about. We've all been guilty of answering the question "How are you?" with a false "Great, fantastic, amazing!" We wanted to tell the truth and build an authentic friendship with each other. We wanted to be totally vulnerable and open with what we were going through in life. And we have certainly gone through it. Jen battled a painful fertility journey for 10 years. I battled suicidal postpartum depression and then Bennett's health situation. Now I am losing my father to Pick's Disease, a rare and aggressive form of dementia, at 65 years old. We built something really special in our friendship and wanted to show other women that they could do the same. We also wanted to highlight all the incredible women in our lives! We wanted to show others that vulnerability is a superpower and it's only through opening ourselves up and sharing the things that we've been through that we take ourselves out of isolation and connect.

We call Womaze your "toolbox for life" because we feature tools for mental health, self-care, relationships, body image, and more. What are some of your top tools for life?

Years ago I was given the advice that our most important job as human beings is to remain open. Whether you are moving through something painful, joyful, celebratory, or traumatic . . . just stay open. It's especially difficult to do so when you are going through something that's extremely hard because our first instinct is often to escape, deny, resist, etc. However, if you can stay open and vulnerable inside of all the feelings, that's where the growth exists. That's where the miracles and magic live. Meditation and exercise are critical to my mental and emotional health. The dopamine and oxytocin rush that you get from moving your body is super important. The stillness that you get from stopping, breathing, and turning within is a necessity if you want to live a life of awareness. Lifting weights is the majority of my physical training. I have osteopenia and lifting weights is the first line of defense. I eat healthy, lots of protein. I think of my being as something that is sacred. I honestly didn't truly learn this until my youngest was born with multiple heart defects. He had three heart surgeries before the age of two. Bennett is doing well, but our health is not given. Life is very, very precious. Most importantly, give yourself a break. Be kind to you. Laugh, have dance parties, let yourself off the hook. You are probably doing the best you can. And if not, shift gears and get it together. You have everything you need right inside of you!

What is one challenge that you turned into an opportunity?

I've turned the challenge of my son being born with multiple heart defects and my dad's dementia into an opportunity to raise awareness and money for places like Children's Hospital of Los Angeles and The Alzheimer's Association that are truly making a difference. I became a spokesperson for both organizations. I recently joined the board of CHLA. It's been one of the greatest honors of my life to be a part of both. It is so important to turn your pain into purpose.

What is one of the best pieces of wisdom and advice you've heard?

I'll go back to what I said above about remaining open. It was a game changer for me. Feel your feelings and do not be afraid to walk through the valleys. Plus, don't be afraid to share what you are experiencing with others. It really taught me that I can trust myself.

What lesson are you currently learning?

I am currently learning the self-care lesson and what that REALLY means. We think it means doing, but it actually means being. Just being. Yes, working out, eating healthy, pedicures, facials . . . that can all be a part of your self-care routine. But, all of that requires doing when sometimes we really just need to BE. We need to sit and watch a sunset. I get that we don't always have the time to watch the sky turn from day to night but, we need to find that type of "being in the moment" in other ways. I am in the process of learning what that actually entails.

What are a few of the things you're most passionate about?

I am passionate about my children, my husband, my family, and my friends. I am passionate about Children's Hospital of Los Angeles and finding a cure for Alzheimer's. I am passionate about being a story teller and telling stories that matter!


What's one message that you think the world needs to hear?

Life is a gift. A very precious gift. Each and every one of us has a choice: to make the most of that gift or let it fall away. It's important to have purpose in order to make the most of your life. I believe purpose to be two-fold. Nikki DeLoach Reveals This Emotional 'Two Turtle Doves' Scene Was Based On A True Story



allmarkies get to see even more of Nikki DeLoach on their screens when her third Hallmark movie — and second with Michael Rady — of the year, "Two Turtle Doves," premieres on Hallmark Movies & Mysteries tonight.

The new 2019 Miracles of <u>Christmas</u> film, which was helmed by first-time Hallmark director Lesley Demetriades and written by Sarah Montana based on a story by Lesley, Christine Demetriades and Ian Carroll follows as "Dr. Sharon [Harper, played by DeLoach] searches for a beloved family heirloom in a small Christmas town," according to the synopsis. "When she unexpectedly discovers an adorable little girl and her disheartened father (Rady), she realizes that Christmas miracles really do happen."

In anticipation of the "Two Turtle Doves" premiere Friday, International Business Times spoke with <u>DeLoach</u> all about what makes this Christmas movie so special, the difference between this <u>Hallmark</u> film and her last with Rady ("Love to the Rescue") and the based-on-a-true-story scene that had her fighting back tears.

International Business Times: What can you tell us about your new Hallmark Movies & Mysteries Christmas film, "Two Turtle Doves"?

Nikki DeLoach: Our director Lesley and her mother came up with this beautiful idea of two characters that are both grieving in their lives but in different ways. My character recently lost her grandmother, and Michael Rady's character lost his wife a couple of years back. And they wanted to tell a story of two characters that are trying to move through grief over the holiday. While it may sound like a real downer, it's actually not because... [it's about] how if you can allow yourself to open up, and if you open up to not moving through the grief in isolation, and you can do that with someone else, along the way you might just find magic and miracles, and you also might find love. And that is the story that we're telling.

IBT: Did you feel it was important to tell this story about dealing with grief around the holidays?

DeLoach: Yes, it's so important because the holidays are the hardest time, and grief is universal. We all know the feeling of losing something, whether it's a beloved pet or a human being in our lives that we loved deeply. And if you haven't experienced that, you're going to at some point in your life, and you're going to have the experience of having to move through that at the holidays, which is the toughest time to do so.

We still have all the fun that Hallmark movies offer and all the romance that they offer, but we also tell the story inside of it, and I think that it's something that a lot of people will be able to relate to.

IBT: Did Hallmark reach out to you about doing this movie, or did you reach out to them about wanting to help tell this story?

DeLoach: I reached out to them because I really wanted to be a part of Lesley's story. I really wanted to make it happen, and I also, whenever I reached out to them, I said, "Listen, if you can throw Michael Rady in that mix, then it'll be the best early Christmas present possible for me because I really think Michael and I could drive this home and knock it out of the park for Lesley."

IBT: What are the differences between your "Two Turtle Doves" and "Love to the Rescue" characters?

DeLoach: In "Love to the Rescue," I played a very free, playful, throw-spaghetti-up-against-the-wall, life-is-nothing-but-fun kind of character. In "Two Turtle Doves," I loved my character because I played a Brené Brown type. She's a scientist, and her job is really to research the things that matter, and for her, her focus is trauma on the brain, and one of the things [she focuses on is grief].

IBT: Is there a scene you really loved shooting or that you can't wait for fans to see?

DeLoach: There was a scene that we shot that was very emotional to get through...It was really difficult in this scene for both me and Michael to get through it without sobbing because we knew it was real. Our writer, Sarah Montana...she lost her mother and one of her siblings when she was younger. They were killed by a person who had befriended the family, and it was incredibly tragic, and all that was left was her dad and her brother. And in this scene — she wrote this scene mirroring an experience she had had with her own brother over the holidays where her brother admitted to her that he had been trying not to be sad or to show anyone he was sad because he didn't want to make other people feel sad, and she was like, "It's okay, buddy, it's okay to feel sad. We all feel sad." And he was like, "Yeah, but it just looks like you're being so happy and being so strong, and I don't know how to do that the way that you do." And she was like, "I'm not, though, I am heartbroken underneath. I just didn't want to make you feel that way." And he was like, "Will I feel this way forever? Will Christmas always feel like this? Will the holidays always feel like this?"

She basically brought that scene to life for "Two Turtle Doves," but in this experience we were having it with Michaela [Russell] and Michael's characters. Michaela comes in and she has that same conversation and is like, "Will Christmas always feel this way?" And because we knew that it was planted in reality for Sarah, it was really hard to get through.

If you don't have tears in your eyes during that scene, you might be a robot.

Exclusive Interview: Pop-Culturalist Chats with Nikki DeLoach



Nikki DeLoach has always known she wanted to pursue a career in the arts, but it hasn't come without its challenges, setbacks, and sacrifices. Like her character Natalie in Truly, Madly, Sweetly, premiering tonight at 9/8c on the Hallmark Channel, Nikki has continued to push forward and has never given up on her dreams. She's built an illustrious career that spans across film, television, and music, including roles on MTV's critically acclaimed #1 scripted series, Awkward., Days of Our Lives, North Shore, and countless others. She's taken each experience as an opportunity to learn more about herself and her story is an inspiring message for all the dreamers out there. Pop-Culturalist was lucky enough to chat with Nikki about Truly, Madly, Sweetly, how she balances life as a mom and wife with her career, and a possible Awkward. reunion.

P-C: Tell us about Truly, Madly, Sweetly, your character, and what drew you to that project.

Nikki: Truly, Madly, Sweetly is about a girl named Natalie, who is a dreamer and a baker, and Eric, who is more of a businessman. The two of them get thrown together because of a woman named Bea, who owns a bakery. She's Eric's aunt and Natalie's mentor. She taught Natalie how to bake. The two of them inherit Aunt Bea's old bakery. They have to come together and decide what to do with the bakery. He wants to sell it. She wants to keep it. She wants to have her own bakery like she's always dreamed of, and she wants to preserve Aunt Bea's legacy. Like all Hallmark movies, they end happily ever after. It's more of a journey about the two characters getting there.

What I loved about this movie is that it's a real two-hander. They gave the guy a great storyline, as well as the lead actress. Sometimes, it's just the lead actress who has the storyline. There's a lot of comedy and it's a sweet story. The moral of the story is to bet on yourself and never give up on your dreams. For me, that's what drew me to it.

In my life, I've been knocked down so many times. I've been in this business for over thirty years, ever since I was a little kid. I've had to start over so many times when I didn't even have two dimes to rub together, just like Natalie. When we find her at the beginning of the movie, she's starting over. Her boyfriend has broken her heart and he's also stolen all of her recipes and turned them into a book that he claims to be his own. Now, he's experiencing superstardom, while she's working in a food truck. She's

barely even making the payment on that! But she never gives up. I think that's what's super inspiring about this character and this story. Along the way, she takes another chance at love.

P-C: Your co-star, Dylan, is a writer and executive producer on this film. He's said in previous interviews that he has always pictured you as Natalie. How did the two of you meet and does that add an extra layer of pressure heading into filming?

Nikki: [laughs] A couple of years ago, I went up to him at a Hallmark event and we started talking. He and his wife are both writers, and I told him, "I'm super interested in working with women in this industry who are writers, producers, and directors." He jokingly was like, "But, not me!" I was like, "No, no, no, you too!" They're a team. They work together as a team. I find what he and his wife do terrific. It's great that they work together.

I've always heard he was a terrific producer to work with. For me, in my life, I have two kids, I have a lot going on. I want to work with people that are good people. I want to have good experiences as much as possible. Any time that you can set yourself up for a good time, you want to. That made me really interested in working with Dylan. When this came along, I had a seven-month-old. We were coming off not only just having a baby, but having a baby who had open heart surgery at five-days-old. He had just gotten off oxygen when Hallmark called. It was a hard decision, in terms of my personal life, but it was an easy decision to make professionally.

P-C: How are you able to juggle both your personal and professional life?

Nikki: It's hard. It's really hard. Any mom who tells me that they've found a great balance, I'm always like, "What's your secret?" I have so many friends who are moms and they work. A lot of them run huge businesses. I find that you can't find balance. Balance is b.s. in a way. [laughs] You do the best that you can and that's the truth. But at any given time, you're not fulfilling one of your jobs. You can't be in two places at one time. When I'm with my kids, I can't be at work, and when I'm at work, I can't be with my kids, and then there's the husband! He always says he comes third. [laughs] I don't know that you can actually find the perfect balance, but for me, my family always comes first.

If there's anything that I need to handle or if I need to be with them, then work has to wait. That's just how it is. With that being said, I had a mother who loved her job. I saw her work from the time I was a little girl. It was so inspiring, and it built so much confidence in me and so much self-worth. I had this beautiful example of what it was to be a working mother, and I want to give that to my kids. I want to show my sons what that looks like. I want them to see their mom who's not only fulfilled in her family life but also her work life. That's really important to me. I may never find the perfect balance but at the end of the day, it's about having your priorities in line. For me, it's family first and work second.

P-C: That's a great answer! Like you said earlier, Aunt Bea is a mentor to Natalie. Who was that person for you in your career?

Nikki: Oh, wow! That's a really, really, good question. It's interesting. I've been lucky enough to have had a few mentors in my career. I've had so many people throughout my life who have inspired me, and I've had a lot of great teachers.

It started with my dance teacher when I was four-years-old. I've been lucky enough to have had a lot of mentors in life, not necessarily in the industry, but mostly in life, which I feel is more important. I'm a teacher myself. I teach at Warner Loughlin Studios and I teach comedy and drama at UCLA. I find that one of the more rewarding experiences about being a teacher is that you get to help other people believe in themselves and help them find their self-worth. You get to help them find their creative center and help them get inspired by their own lives. I've been lucky enough to have a lot of those people. But, the most important job of a teacher is to teach them to become the best version of themselves as human beings. I always say, "You feed the human. You feed the actor."

For me, Chuck Yerger was a huge mentor to me. He was my teacher in the Mickey Mouse Club. I had to do on-location education because I was on set. Chuck taught everything from English to science. He was a great mentor as a human being. He's one of the best people I've ever known in my life. Also, my grandfather was such a big mentor to me. I have this wonderful woman in my life, Madeline. I've known her since my late twenties. She is my North Star. She's a true guiding light in my life. I look around me and there are so many people who have shown up to help me to be the person I am now and help me be the best version of myself, and they continue to do so. I really feel that if you have people in your life that are helping you grow your human self, it's going to affect your creative self.

P-C: Like you said earlier, Natalie has always dreamed of owning her own bakery. When the opportunity presents itself, it'll force her to overcome her trust issues. What was your favorite aspect to explore with your character?

Nikki: Honestly, it was the trust thing. It was really interesting to explore, even though I've been with my husband for nineteen years. [laughs] I obviously have a lot of trust in my man. I think just having faith in general, you know? The last year of my life has definitely been the most difficult I've ever experienced with my son. I have to say it's taken an overwhelming amount of trust and faith in believing that he's going to be okay, that he's going to make it, that his heart will be made whole, and that he's going to live an incredible life.

It's very easy to allow fear and doubt to plague not just your mind but your heart, and let it consume you. You're a human being. You're going to have doubts and that's okay. Fear is okay because fear is a great teacher. It forces you to wake up and be present. It tells you to pay attention to what's happening right now because things are changing. However, it's the way that you move through the fear and doubt that matters. It teaches you a lot about how you trust and whether you have faith. It applies to anything in life, whether it's the health of your kid or falling in love—it's taking that leap of faith and believing that it's all going to be okay in the end. Coming out of the situation that I had, it was creatively a lot of fun to explore her issues with trust. I think it's also why I was the right actress to play this role at this time.

P-C: Later this year, you're also starring and executively producing Reunited at Christmas. Can you tell us about that project and how challenging it is to have dual roles?

Nikki: [laughs] It's been quite the challenge. I can't even tell you! It's funny, usually when you're doing these Hallmark movies, it's a pretty easy experience. You're working with crews who do a lot of these. They know the footwork. They know what needs to happen. Everyone has their jobs. But, everything and anything that we could have had against us, in terms of a challenge, we definitely experienced it with this movie. But, we're making a great movie. It looks amazing and it's so good. I'm really excited about it. It's a different project for Hallmark. I'm so proud that they want to tell this story and they're allowing me to tell this story. I pitched this idea to them about a year ago and it's about a family who has gone through a divorce. For about six years, they've all experienced the holiday shuffle with the kids going between the mom and dad. They've fallen apart in terms of spending time together. Everyone ends up going their separate ways. The matriarch of the family ends up passing away. Her dying wish is that they spend one last Christmas together, celebrating with all the traditions that they used to do as a family. That's a very different story for Hallmark to tell.

It's a true ensemble piece. There's not just a strong A-storyline with the romance. There's a strong Bstoryline with the parents coming back together. This is a very real Hallmark movie. We'll even see the awkwardness of a family who hasn't been together for a long time. We'll see them coming together and the moments where you remember what you used to fight about. But in the end, what I wanted to accomplish with this story is for people to see that no matter what you've been through as a family, it's so important to come together, especially for the holidays, and spend time with each other, and make the traditions and being together a priority. Life is so short. You'll wake up and wonder why you let all that time pass you by. That was the true inspiration of the story. No matter where you move to, no matter what happens, always try to come back together.

The other thing that's quite different about this story is that I play a girl who's afraid to get married. She's scared to pull that trigger and say yes. She's scared of getting her heart broken. She's scared of ending up like her parents. There are so many cool, interesting parts to this story that I think are still very Hallmark, and still very on brand, but at the same time, it's a little different. I think the audience is really going to relate to it. I think it'll do well. I hope it does! It's my first time producing one of these. I'm just like, "Please, God, let it do well."



P-C: The film actually finds you reuniting with Mike Faiola, your co-star from Awkward. How helpful is that as an actor to go into a project with someone you've worked with and know? Nikki: It's super helpful. When I was looking for guys for this project, I really, truly had a short list. I knew that I wanted a specific type of guy and Mike definitely fell into that category. Also, when you're doing movies like this and you have three weeks to finish it, it's a grueling schedule. It's not always the most glamorous. Everyone needs to be all-hands-on-deck. You can't be a prima donna, a princess, or a prime. You have to improve how have to can't done no metter what it takes. I know howing worked

doing movies like this and you have three weeks to finish it, it's a grueling schedule. It's not always the most glamorous. Everyone needs to be all-hands-on-deck. You can't be a prima donna, a princess, or a prince. You have to jump in and you have to get it done, no matter what it takes. I knew, having worked with Mike for six years, that no matter what he was going to have a great attitude, he was going to show up prepared, he was going to do a great job, he was going to have a lot of fun, and make the best out of any situation.

I did a Hallmark movie last year and it was a spring baseball movie. We were out on the field and it rained every single day of the production. It didn't just rain, it snowed and it hailed. We were going back to Vancouver and we were thinking that we could be up against that again. Steve Monroe was the director of Perfect Catch, the film where we had so many weather elements against us. I was so impressed by how he kept his cool. I don't know how he did it, but he made it look like that movie didn't have a drop of rain. I was like, "We need this guy!"

From Steve to Mike, I'm so lucky to have them both on this project. It was such an easy choice across the board. It was so nice to be reunited on this movie and hopefully, if it does really well, we'll get to do the sequel and be reunited again.

P-C: You've done a few projects with Hallmark. How did that relationship form and what has it meant for your career?

Nikki: I love working with Hallmark. They are so good to me and my family. They walk the talk. The things that they stand for, they really, really believe in, which are family, faith, love, happy endings, and resilience in their characters. They're all things that every single person at the network truly believes in. It's not only inspiring, but it's uncommon in our industry. I have a lot of respect for them.

I also love being able to do romantic comedies. I grew up on them. That's what I watched as a kid. That's where I learned comedy. It was from watching When Harry Met Sally, While You Were Sleeping, and every single Julia Roberts movie. There aren't enough romantic comedies out there. Hallmark is churning them out.

Outside of that, it came along at a time in my career where I also wanted to be a very active participant in

my children's lives. These projects allow me to do that. For this one, I did prep, then I went home, and then I came back for the filming. Then, I'll go home, write, and develop my next project until I come and do the next one. It allows me to be in both worlds. For that, I'm forever grateful to them.

Working with Bill Abbott, Michelle Vicary, and Randy Pope, they're really just personable, wonderful, hands-on executives. I can pick up the phone and call Randy, Michelle, or Bill anytime. I can email them and get a response back within 24 hours. What network does that?

P-C: There have been a lot of television shows that have been rebooted recently. Do you ever think we'll see an Awkward, reunion?

Nikki: I would love it so much! I have been thinking about pitching MTV an Awkward. movie or miniseries. I think a movie would be a lot of fun. It could be their ten-year high school reunion. I've been
toying with the idea of going to MTV and pitching them that. If MTV doesn't want to do it, there's
always Netflix. I think it would do so well. Awkward. ended too soon. It was at a weird time when people
were really starting to stream, especially our demographic that was watching Awkward., that's how they
were getting all their shows. I believe MTV made a big mistake with pulling the plug. They were too
focused on the live numbers and I think our audience agrees. I think there are a lot of people who would
have followed that show for another two or three seasons. Hopefully, we can do some kind of reunion
show or movie. The other show that I think would be so fun to bring back to life is North Shore. I did that
in Hawaii for Fox. I'd love to go back to Hawaii. That whole cast was so much fun to work with. It was a
soapy, nighttime drama. Also, girls and guys in bathing suits, beautiful beaches, cocktails, drama—who
wouldn't want to see that?

P-C: When you look back on your Awkward. experience, what stands out to you the most and what was the biggest lesson you learned?

Nikki: I'll come at this from both a personal and professional aspect. From a professional aspect, I learned what kind of material I wanted to do. Lauren Iungerich created such a cool, fun, unique world to play in as an actor. It was super challenging and fun, especially for a character like Lacey. She had to be both dramatic and comedic. She was so outlandish at times, but I had to find a way to always ground her so the audience would believe she was a mother. I was always working really hard to find that right line of making them laugh but also making people believe that this mother is a real human being who would say these things to her daughter. I loved being challenged like that on a daily basis. It also was so much fun to play Lacey. I miss her every single day. She was such a challenging character. When I found her and was able to bring her to life, I realized I could do anything that I put my mind to. It gave me a lot of confidence.

Personally, I'm still friends with every single person on that show...not just friends; we're family. We're family forever. That was the greatest gift. I will forever be grateful for the relationships that I built on that show. Desi Lydic is one of my best friends. I don't know what I'd do without her in my life. Barret Swatek, who played Ally, is also one of my best friends. I love her dearly. Jillian, I talk to her every week. Molly, Beau, Brett, they all come to my kids' birthday parties. All of them have a special place in my heart. At the end of the day, it was one of those magical situations where I was fulfilled on both a professional and personal level. That's the kind of projects I want to be involved in. That's the kind of stuff I want to do. Life is too short to do something that may professionally fulfill you but personally make you miserable. I grew up on that show in a really big way.

- Q) What are some of the themes and undertones of the film *Truly*, *Madly*, *Sweetly*?
- A) Some of the themes of *Truly, Madly, Sweetly* are learning to trust again, taking a leap of faith, and never giving up on love or your dreams.
- Q) *Truly, Madly, Sweetly* isn't your average meet cute movie, what do you think that it is about food that tends to bring and bond people together?

- A) Food makes people feel things. Whether it's a dish that you grew up on or certain foods that you eat when you celebrate, there is an emotional component to food. Also, food usually makes people happy and gives them that warm and fuzzy feeling. I think that's why people love watching movies that involve food.
- Q) The hallmark of Hallmark movies is the great balance of heart and humor as well as love and lessons. How does this film stay consistent with that?
- A) Absolutely. It truly is a romantic comedy, blending the heart and humor in such a fun way.
- Q) Dylan Neal plays your love interest in the film, what did you enjoy the most about getting to work opposite of him?
- A) I loved working with Dylan. He is prepared, present, and very funny. I don't know that he gets to exercise his comedy chops often, but he does in this movie and he is terrific. Dylan is such a great partner. I can't wait to do more with him.
- Q) Was there any specific scene that you found challenging to film and why?
- A) Well, I am not a baker. So, for me, the most difficult part of the movie was when I had to bake on camera. I probably needed a good month of lessons, but there wasn't any time. Maybe I will get a head start for Part 2.

- Q) What do you think it is about the film that will draw viewers in?
- A) I think the viewers will love the themes of this movies. Everyone can relate to finding the courage to take a leap of faith whether that's in love or career. Also, I believe that most people have experienced betrayal in their lives and have had to learn to trust again, which is something that Natalie has to do. Plus, this movie is truly so sweet and so much fun to watch. It was really one of my favorite on-set experiences and I think that comes through on screen.
- Q) We have seen you take on these dramatic diverse roles that really test and showcase your range. They have this incredible balance of vulnerability, complexity, and are innately compelling. How does this extend with *Truly*, *Madly*, *Sweetly* and what draws you into or connects you with these characters?
- A) I love challenging myself as an actor. I know that if it scares me, I should probably say yes. The thing I loved about *Truly*, *Madly*, *Sweetly* is getting to play in the romantic comedy world. I grew up on these. Meg Ryan, Sandra Bullock, Julia Roberts I watched these ladies fall in and out of love growing up. And to this day, I will choose to watch a romantic comedy over anything else. The problem is there are not enough of them. This movie is a true romantic comedy, and it was such a joy to play in this world.
- Q) With an extensive career we have seen your characters push boundaries and turn their pain into power. What is it about these fierce but flawed driven females that we relate to and need to see more of?

A) This is such an excellent question. Thank you for asking. In life, I am a big believer in turning your pain into purpose. So, I love to see stories that portray that. We are all human beings who make human mistakes, who are often not the best versions of ourselves, who often get our hearts broken, who often experience tremendous pain. And I think it is extremely important to show it all. Not just women who are perfect, not just the ones who are getting everything right. It's not real and it portrays a false sense of who we are. It's also super limiting. As women, we are all the things. We are vulnerable, fierce, flawed and funny. We need to see that in the stories that we tell about women.

Q) How does the setting of the film play a role in the movie?

A) This movie is set in Fall. Metaphorically speaking, a lot of Natalie's past falls away in this movie. Personally, I love this time of year. It's not too hot, not too cold. It's just right.

Q) Your character Natalie runs a cupcake food truck, did this make you sick of sweets or crave them even more?

A) I actually don't really eat sugar! I have never eaten it, even as a kid. I was the kid who never ate her own birthday cake. I have a bad reaction to processed sugar. With that being said, in my last pregnancy, I couldn't get enough of a certain type of fresh baked cookie from Bristol Farms in LA. I would stop there every week and get a dozen and eat them all myself. It was kind of nice to be able to eat sweets and not have a terrible reaction to them.

- Q) What do you hope viewers take away from watching *Truly*, *Madly*, *Sweetly*?
- A) I hope it makes them really happy. I hope it makes them feel warm and fuzzy on the inside. I hope they can leave their troubles behind for two hours and allow a smile to spread across their faces.
- Q) Besides your current Hallmark movie that airs on Saturday, what can you tell us about the holiday movie that you have been developing called *Reunited at Christmas*?
- A) We are almost done filming *Reunited at Christmas*! It has been such a fun experience bringing this movie to life. It's about a family who hasn't been together in years over the holidays. When the matriarch of the family, Nana Madaline, passes away she leaves behind a dying wish which was that the whole family spend one last Christmas together, in her house, doing all the traditions they used to. The family is reunited, but it's quite the journey for them to get there. It's a beautiful story with so much heart.
- Q) Why is it important for you to not just star in these projects, but also be a part of them from the ground up between both developing and producing; especially as a female in the industry?

A) I have always called myself a storyteller. Even when I was a little kid playing pretend, I would write out a script and give all my friends their role. I would direct it. I would pretend to shoot it with a camera. I was always interested in every aspect of bringing a story to life. It truly fulfills me on a level that just being an actor could never do. I love starting with a seed of an idea and seeing what can be built. I also love teamwork and collaboration. I am thrilled with how many women are now moving into positions of power, such as writer, producer, director. We need to be the ones telling our stories.

At this stage of your career, what do you think you have learned from the amazing variety of roles and projects you have worked on?

NIKKI: I've been so fortunate to play so many different characters, both dramatic and comedic. I've learned more about humanity, for sure. I've become more compassionate because of that knowledge. When you step inside a character you have to justify their behavior; why they think and feel the way they do. It teaches you a great deal about human behavior. It's why story-telling often brings people together, makes people feel less alone. And with comedy...how great does it feel to sit with others and laugh. It's a connective tissue for humanity.

What are the perks of where you are in your career right now?

NIKKI: I don't have to say "yes" to everything. I am able to pick and choose what I want to do, and that is a tremendous luxury. One that I never take for granted.

Has there been any great advice you have gotten? What advice would you offer to other upcoming and aspiring actors?

NIKKI: My acting studio, Warner Loughlin Studios, where I act and teach has been such a safe haven for me. I grow and learn both professionally and personally every time I step through those doors. I would suggest to find a place, a community of people, that offers you a safe, positive environment in which to learn and grow. Warner teaches us to leave our egos at the door; ego being the great killer of creativity. I've always loved that and try to always live by it in my work and my life. I would also say to find something outside of acting that really inspires you, a passion where you can channel your creativity and energy. And even better, if that passion is able to bring in income. I've been in this business over 25 years. It's up and down. Having other interests keeps a person from riding an emotional roller coaster, which is dangerous. Lastly, don't allow your self-worth to be determined by exteriors. You are always enough. Always.

What do you aspire to do next?

NIKKI: Create material. Produce. Write. Continue to say yes to inspiring stories and characters as an actor. More importantly, I am more passionate than ever to get out in the world and make a difference. I've always be involved in organizations that are doing great things in our world. But, I feel now more than ever that people not only need basics like food, water, clothes, shelter, they need hope, love, faith and joy. They need to know that everything is going to be okay. I'm determined to be a part of that movement. Most importantly, I want to be the best mom I can be to my child.

This Awkward star talks girl crushes, tequila, and guilty pleasures.

Tell me about your role on the MTV show Awkward.

It's my favorite role I've ever had. I play Lacey Hamilton - the overbearing, narcissistic, self-involved, but very well intentioned mother to Jenna Hamilton; it's the most fun I've ever had playing a character. It's such a blessing and I feel so fortunate that we're about to go into our 3rd season.

You definitely play the unconventional mother. Is that something you were used to growing up?

Not at all! In fact my mother was a teacher, then she was a principal, and now she is the superintendent of a school system. I had very strict parents, so Lacey is a departure for me across the board.

What was your high school experience like?

I grew up on set; I tend to think of the Mickey Mouse Club as being my own version of high school. I was cast as one of the seven younger kids who came on: it was me, Justin, Britney, Christina Aguilera, and Ryan Gosling. We were like the freshmen coming into high school that no one really wanted to be friends with, and we wanted so badly to fit in and for people to like us. Yes, it was different because it was in the world of the entertainment business, but it doesn't feel any different. It was very awkward.

Have you ever been fought over by two guys the way Jenna Hamilton is on the show?

Never! I don't know that I would want to be fought over. I think it would give me a lot of anxiety actually, to be fought over by two different guys. Plus I've been in a relationship for like 12 years now, so my window of guys fighting over me was gone a long time ago.

If you weren't an actress what would you be doing with your life?

Oh my gosh! I've actually thought about that question a million times. If I wasn't an actress I'd definitely want to do something in the arts and something that was very creative. I would hopefully produce, direct, and create material because I still want to be a storyteller. And then outside of that, something not in the arts whatsoever, I'd probably want to do something in the world of psychology, or being a counselor in some way shape or form. I went to school and got my degree in Psychology and English.

What is your favorite movie of all time?

O-M-G. My favorite movie of all time?! I would have to say Funny Girl. That movie encapsulates everything that made me want to be in the entertainment business. Barbra Streisand's performance in that movie was perfection to me. Every time I travel I take that movie with me and watch it while I'm going to sleep, when I get up in the morning, I just love it, she's perfect in it.

What is the last meal you would want to eat before you die?

I would have to say it would be southern cooking by my mom and my sister. I'm talking fried pork chops, sweet potato soufflé, turkey with giblet gravy and dressing, green bean casserole, my mom's strawberry pretzel salad.

Q&A: THE BEAUTIFUL NIKKI DELOACH OF "AWKWARD"



Fans of MTV's Awkward are more likely to be found clicking around the site of our sister magazine Seventeen than over here. But it turns out the show, which kicked off its third season last night, has broad appeal and good reviews. That's thanks no doubt in part to the delightful Nikki DeLoach. The former Mouseketeer plays Lacey Hamilton, the cool and sexy mother of the show's stroppy star. She's also guest-starring in an episode of CSI set to air May 1. From a baseball field in Georgia, she talked about why you should tune in to Awkward, coming up with Justin Timberlake, struggling in show business, and wardrobe enhancement.

ESQUIRE.COM: How are you?

NIKKI DELOACH: I'm doing great. I'm actually in Athens, Georgia, right now, hanging out with my best friend. My brother plays baseball for UGA, so I've flown into town to try and catch some of his baseball game.

ESQ: Are you sitting in the bleachers right now?

ND: No, does it sound like I'm in the bleachers? [Laughs.]

ESQ: It seemed like you just hopped on a phone call, watching the game.

ND: I just finished walking with my girlfriend through a park. We're just hanging out today.

ESQ: That sounds lovely. I can hear a little Southern accent.

ND: Especially since I've been down here, it comes out immediately. I don't ever want to lose it, but for on-camera stuff I have to pay attention.

ESQ: Is it hard to cover up?

ND: Actually no. I'm so used to jumping in and out of it. I learned how to get rid of the Southern accent when I was like 11 years old and living in New York for the summer doing modeling and commercials and auditioning for Broadway. The mother I lived with for the summer taught me how to drop my Southern accent.

ESQ: I had never seen Awkward before preparing for this. I was pleasantly surprised.

ND: Thank you so much. I really appreciate it. I've done a lot of bad TV and bad movies. I've also done some really great things. Awkward is a show I'm proud to tell people to watch. And most of the time people are like, "No, I watched it, and it's fantastic." And even if they're more of a Breaking Bad or Game of Thrones type of person, they can appreciate that it's well-written and well-done and it'll make them giggle.

ESQ: I'm not sure if our readership is the target audience.

ND: My character shows up, she's scantily clad, so maybe there's an audience for that...

ESQ: There are a lot of tank tops...

ND: Tank tops, bathing suits, bikinis. She likes to dress inappropriately.

ESQ: So you were a child actor.

ND: I've been doing this my whole life. I'm not gonna lie. It's never been easy. It's a tough, tough industry, and you really have to believe in yourself. And some days you wake up, and you're like, I don't know if I have it in me to be told "no" again for the thousandth time. But I love it so much, and the fact that I can say I have been a working actor for the majority of my time in the industry — I feel very lucky.

ESQ: It seems like there's this group of working actresses — you'll find them on episodes of CSI, which you've been on. It's a fascinating life. Maybe not the most secure all the time?

ND: No, you're right, it's not the most secure. You don't know what the future's gonna bring. I've had to figure out other ways to supplement my income at times just to continue what I love to do. The bottom line is along the way you have to figure out what makes me happy outside this business. Because if you base your happiness on this industry and being successful, you're going to be let down at some point in time. It took me a little while to learn that, but once I figured that out, everything got a whole lot easier.

ESQ: Plus, if you were working a nine-to-five, you couldn't make it to your brother's Monday baseball game.

ND: Yeah! The last few years it's been really hard because we literally shoot Awkward during his baseball season. This year, since we're doing 20 episodes, we're taking a 28-day hiatus. So on the hiatus, when I had found out my date, I immediately booked my ticket to Athens. I was like, when can I go during that month and how many games can I get in in that amount of time? I got in on the red-eye Friday morning, and I saw a game Friday night, Saturday, Sunday night, and then tomorrow night we're playing Georgia Tech, and I'm leaving the next day to fly back for press for the new season.

ESQ: How old is your brother?

ND: My brother is 22. There's 11 years difference between myself and him. And my sister and I are three years apart, so it was like starting all over for the family. He's the best thing. He's our baby.

ESQ: I can imagine in the stands there are some 19-to-23-year-old guys who are fans of Awkward but may not admit it.

ND: It's so weird because I've mostly been able to live a life of anonymity, but now, everywhere I've gone, whether it's the yogurt shop or baseball field, girls and guys have recognized me and said, "Aren't you on that show?" Honestly, it's not about me. I just play a character that's on the show. It's really about the show and the fact that people love the show. It lets me know that maybe I'll get one more year of employment out of it.

ESQ: You're playing basically the youngest mom to a 16-year-old in America. Why?

ND: That's a really good question. It is kind of weird. I remember when I first auditioned for the show, and a lot of my other actress friends who are my age were like, "Oh, I wouldn't do that. I'm not ready to play a mom." And I was like, you know, I really don't care. This role comes along once in a lifetime. I'm going for it. Thank God MTV thought I was old enough to play the mother, because if not, I wouldn't have this job. She's one of my favorite characters I've ever played in my life. She's so outrageous and ridiculous.

ESQ: It must be weird, too, to be in your early thirties and be one of the older people on the show.

ND: That was more strange than anything else, to be called "Momma Nikki" on set. I was like, wait a second, I don't even have my own child yet.

ESQ: Can you keep up with the 17-year-olds these days?

ND: What are 17-year-olds doing these days? That beats me. I have no idea, and honestly, I don't know if I want to know. That scares me a bit.

ESQ: You started on Mickey Mouse Club with Britney Spears and Justin Timberlake, right?

ND: I did. I started with a group of people I was cast in. There were seven of us. There was Justin

Timberlake and Christina Aguilera and Britney Spears and Ryan Gosling and myself and a guy named

Tate Lynche, who went on to dance on Broadway — he's an incredible dancer — and another kid named

T.J. Fantini. It's crazy, right?

ESQ: Yeah, were you buddies with them? I can't imagine the setup with hormonal 13-year-olds.

ND: Yeah, actually Justin was my best friend on that show. We were only a year apart, and from the casting camp we immediately hit if off. We wanted to stay in the same housing complex when we moved down to Orlando for the first season, and since then we've remained really good friends. His family is my extended family.

ESQ: That's fantastic.

ND: Yeah, he's a great guy.

ESQ: So there's no Mickey Mouse Club e-mail chain going on.

ND: No. [Laughs.] He's really the only one from that group of seven I still keep in touch with.

ESQ: Can you imagine if you had ended up on Britney Spears's path?

ND: No. Honestly, when all of their careers were blowing up, I was really feeling forgotten and left behind. I was working so hard for something and not seeing — they were seeing results, and I wasn't seeing anything, and I really was wondering what did I do wrong and what are they doing right? And I look at that and I go, I don't know. I don't know what it would have done to me if I didn't have failures, lots of failures when I was younger. Because it really humbled me and made me so grateful for any work that I do have, and it forever changed me. I'll never be the same person because I really learned what it was like to fail and be able to know that I can always pick myself up and know that life's really not about constantly being at the top of the mountain. Life's more than that. It's about family and friends and loving yourself, and having a career is just the icing on top of a really good cake. And who knows? I could have ended up going through rough phases in the public eye, and my heart goes out to her, and she seems to be doing so well right now, and deservedly so.

ESQ: You sound like a normal, healthy person. You can still make it down to Georgia and be a real person, so I think you won out in the end.

ND: Yeah, I kinda feel that way. There's some days, like, man, I wish I had a million bucks to help this person or to buy a car because mine's falling apart. But at the end of the day, I'm doing okay.

ESQ: So why should everyone who's reading this watch Awkward?

ND: Awkward is a mixture of Freaks and Geeks and My So Called Life.

ESQ: Good start.

ND: I think there's really an audience for both male and female viewers, because even though it is a female voice, it highlights the male perspective. Everybody remembers what it's like to be in high school: We really never leave those years behind. We have two great guys on the show, Beau Mirchoff who plays Matty, and Brett Davern who plays Jake, who are really the living incarnation of what a lot of guys' experiences were like in high school. It's going to make you laugh, whether you want to laugh or not. There was this 45-year-old man who was sitting in one of my friend's office buildings, and he was watching MTV, and my friend was like, "Oh, you're watching MTV," and he's like, "Yeah, I have two daughters who watch Teen Mom, but you know what show you should really watch? Awkward. It's my favorite show on TV." If you give it a chance, you're gonna find that you like it. Outside of that, there are the tank tops and my breasts, which are enhanced on the show in a really amazing, spectacular way. [Laughs.] So if not for the quality of the show and the laughs, tune in for the breasts.

ESQ: So credit to the costume department?

ND: Exactly. They do such a great job because I don't have them in real life.

'Awkward' Star Teases 'Darker' season



Based off the trailer, it's clear the fall season of Awkward will be the most emotional yet as Jenna falls under Collin's questionable spell and discards her friends in favor of drugs, drinking and debauchery. This turn of events threatens to disrupt my favorite Awkward pairing as parenting becomes intensely trickier for Lacey in the ensuing episodes.

The storyline presented a uniquely odd issue for actress Nikki Deloach, who was pregnant with her first child for the entirety of filming the 10-episode conclusion to season three. And with her baby due any day, ETonline caught up with her to talk about the show hitting close to home, obscuring her ever-growing baby bump on screen and why Lacey might surprise some fans this season!

ETonline: Congratulations on your pregnancy, how have you been feeling?

Nikki Deloach: Look, I'm a very honest person. I'm not going to tell you it's been all roses and sunshowers. Being pregnant has been tough, for me, at least. I spent the first 5 months really sick and then the baby decided to drop on my sciatic nerve. It's beautiful and it's amazing when you actually think about what's happening; it's so profound. I've never been through something so humbling and empowering at the same time. But the actual process of pregnancy is not my favorite.

ETonline: How much of your pregnancy was captured on-screen?

Deloach: 7 months of it! Part of me is excited to see that, but most of me is like, "Oh no!" I put on so much water weight, it's not going to be attractive at all, and Lacey is so consumed by how she looks. The breasts have to be perfect, the waist has to be perfect, the clothes have to be tight, tight, tight. Bless our costume designer because clothing Lacey while me being pregnant had to be the biggest challenge for her! Especially when we got to month six of hiding the baby but being honest to Lacey's aesthetic. That was a challenge.

ETonline: Does Lacey end up carrying a lot of laundry baskets this season?

Deloach: Oh yes. So much laundry. She's doing laundry all the time [laughs]. In one episode I'm so covered with blankets and pillows the only thing you see is my head [laughs]. I have to say, the first 4 months were really difficult because I didn't tell people on the set I was pregnant. I mean, I would vomit in my mouth and swallow it. I know that's so gross, but it's true. Thankfully my brother-in-law works on the show, and he knew, so he would come pull me out of my trailer. The cast is such a family and we share our lives, so the hardest part was not sharing what I was going through.

ETonline: This will be a very dramatic season, was it odd to be going through that with your on-screen child while also pregnant yourself?

Deloach: Oh man, the Jenna and Lacey situation is tough this season. Lacey has to be a disciplinarian and here I am thinking, "One day I will very likely face all these situations with my real child." I don't think the answer is about avoiding that, it's about getting through the hard times together. It's not about the mistakes you make, it's about how you recover and that's kind of the message of this season.

ETonline: Were you surprised by how Lacey reacted to Jenna's behavior in any way?

Deloach: Not surprised in the sense that she actually steps up to the plate. When Lacey's back is up against the wall, she steps up because Lacey has always been the one who is there for Jenna. Even with her inadequate skillset, Jenna has always been Lacey's rock and she is not going to want to lose her daughter. She will do everything possible to keep Jenna healthy, happy and stable. Knowing Lacey the way I do, I wasn't surprised, but I think the audience might be. Lacey has failed in the past so they may realize that she actually knows how to be a disciplinarian. I love that we're showing that side of her this season.

ETonline: What are you excited for the audience to see this season?

Deloach: I'm excited for them to see Jenna and Lacey in a whole new light, but mostly I'm excited for the audience to see how the characters recover from the mistakes they make.

What's next for Lacey in Season 4?

She's really coming into her own. She's wondering, "When Jenna's gone, what does that mean for me and my life? Where am I supposed to go and who am I?" Just as her daughter has pondered the question, "Who am I and who do I want to be?" Lacey is now where her daughter was in previous seasons and she's wondering that for herself."

Was Lacey previously trying to live vicariously through Jenna or was she just trying to encourage Jenna to have the same happiness she had in high school?

All of the above. High school was so great for Lacey and she experienced a fall from grace when she got pregnant and became a teen mom. While she loved her daughter, she also felt a big burden because she had so many dreams and so many things she wanted to do with her life, and now she had a child and her whole life became her child, so she had to leave that all behind and leave college behind.

She was giving Jenna advice through the lens of what she had experienced in her own life instead of letting Jenna figure out who she was outside of who Lacey was.

What frustrates you about Lacey?

Sometimes she gets very superficial and only sees things on a surface level. But at the same time, no one changes overnight; sometimes we take five steps forward only to take 10 steps back, because patterns are really hard to break.

Give me a quick and easy summary of what's coming up in Season 4.

It's supersized. Everything's a little bigger. We're at more locations, there are new cast members and there's lots of stuff going on with senior year.

Interview: Nikki DeLoach Talks "Awkward" and Being on Mickey Mouse Club With Justin Timberlake



Parents can be really embarrassing and actress Nikki DeLoach is no stranger to that. On MTV's Awkward, DeLoach plays Lacey Hamilton, Jenna's (Ashley Rickards) foreveryoung mom who's still trying to live the dream. Case in point: she ditches the soccer mom stereotype for T-shirts so tight they'd make any child cringe and forgoes college to use the cash for a boob job. In real life, DeLoach couldn't be further from the notoriously high-maintenance and irresponsible parent she plays. Deloach actually missed our first scheduled interview to attend a "baby breakdown emergency." In other words, she's got her priorities straight.

Ahead of tomorrow's Awkward mid-season finale, DeLoach took some time to speak to us about the hit MTV series, her days on Mickey Mouse Club alongside Justin Timberlake and Christina Aguilera, and what it was like opening for Britney Spears.

How did you land the role of Lacey Hamilton?

When the audition came through, I had passed on it about two or three times. I thought I

was too young. [Laughs.] That year, for pilot season, I had been going in to play the roles of moms and every time I would go in, casting directors would say, "She's not old enough to play a mom." I got this role [as Lacey], mom of a 15-year-old and I said, "I'm not even wasting my time. I'm not going in." Finally my agent said, "Nikki, they said that they know how old you are. They really want you to go in."

How has playing Lacey affected your role as a mother?

Playing Lacey has taught me a lot of things and one of those things is that you learn from your kids as much as they learn from you. Lacey and Jenna have the dynamic that sometimes Jenna is the adult in the scenario. You learn about patience and you learn a lot about who you are. I'm the mom of a seven-month-old and I've learned a lot about who I am. Some of it good, some of it not so good. [Laughs.]

What's the biggest difference between Lacey and yourself?

We're so totally completely different. I'm a country girl. I was raised on a farm. I'd rather be barefoot or with boots and jeans on and have a Coors light in my hand and Lacey is Real Housewives of Beverly Hills. The one thing we have alike that I think grounds Lacey as a person is the fact that her heart is so big and she is so well-intentioned. She has an inadequate skill set sometimes, but she always means well.

How has your relationship with the cast grown over the course of the show?

I've been in this business long enough to know the magic that has happened from the cast and the show doesn't happen all the time. Desi Lydic, who plays Val, is one of my best friends. Jillian Rose Reed lives down the street from me and is over at my house all the time. It's going to be so hard one day when the show ends! The fact that we won't go to work and see each other every day. I just don't want to think about that right now.

What do you and Jillian do for fun when she visits?

These days she comes over and hangs out with my child. [Laughs.]

We spoke to Jillian awhile back and she told us about behind-the-scenes pranking. Is that still a thing?

We haven't actually had a lot of pranking this season. It used to happen a lot because of Brett Davern, who plays Jake. He's the set prankster.

Do you remember any big pranks?

Brett and Jillian blew up a million balloons and shoved them all inside my car and posted signs all along the outside of it. [Laughs.] I literally could not get my car. I just got rid of the car last year, but I was still finding balloons in it like a year later.

What can we expect for the rest of season?

It's senior year and this season we're taking it all the way up to spring break and it's just a lot of fun senior activities. Of course there is the Matty and Jenna drama. Will they be together? Will they not be together? It's really fun. Last year, the show followed Jenna on this dark path. This season we brought back a lot of the fun of the show.

How would you say Awkward influences teens alongside other shows like Faking It that tackle tough subjects, but ultimately relay a positive message?

Awkward is in a class all its own, compared to any other teen shows on television. From day one, it was really important for our creators and our writers to not only bring the funny, but to also bring the tears. As much as 15-year-olds want to laugh, they also want to cry and they want to feel understood and they don't want to feel alone. Awkward does that in such an authentic way. Yes, there's a lot of comedy and some situations are heightened because it's TV, but in general people love the show because it feels genuine.

You were also on the *Mickey Mouse Club*. Were there certain members of the cast that brought out the best in you?

If I was doing a skit with comedy, Lindsey Alley and Rhona Bennett were always so much fun to work with. I loved performing with Matt [Morris] and Justin [Timberlake] because they were such good dancers and such good singers. Everyone was so talented that they all taught you something about being an entertainer.

Did you look up to any artists at the time for inspiration?

I looked up to everyone, including the kids younger than me. How can you hear Christina Aguilera sing and not be in awe and be inspired by that? I knew I had my own thing going on, meaning, I was never going to have a voice like Christina. There were things I knew that were not me.

What was it like breaking away from MMC and forming your music group, Innosense? It was a little bit darker, to be honest. The music business wasn't for me, but I loved some of the experiences I got to have. I got to tour the country and tour so many parts in Europe and I got to live in Germany. I got to play Madison Square Garden and open for Britney [Spears] and N*SYNC. It was an amazing time and at the end of the day, the way our group ended was really sad. Lou Pearlman had signed us, Backstreet Boys, N*SYNC, and everyone. Groups who had already achieved a certain level of success by the time Lou's schemes and scams had been found out were able to continue to have success and groups that hadn't lost their record contracts because of what he was doing. Now he's in jail. I look back and I'm grateful it ended when it did because I feel it was just supposed to be this small part of my life and I was supposed to grow and learn and have some great experiences and just move on.

What was it like opening for Britney and N*SYNC? How crazy were the fans?

It was incredible! I love to perform. That's why I went into the music industry. With that said, performing in front of 60,000 people who are all N*SYNC fans or Britney fans, that's like performing on steroids. Not many people get to do that. It was an amazing time to be on tour with two huge pop groups who were experiencing unheard of levels of fame and popularity at the time.

Op-Ed: Democracy Is a Participatory Sport; So Get in the Game and Vote

When I sat down to write this piece on the importance of voting, I immediately began listing off all the reasons why

voting is a necessary action that <u>cannot</u> be overstated. However, most of us—including our non-voting citizens—

have already been lectured about the various reasons of why we should vote.

By the way, I passionately support listing all of those arguments, from the historical fight for the right to vote, to the fact that many civil leaders, women, and soldiers died while <u>securing this gift</u> for themselves and for future generations, to the fact that some of this election cycle's biggest issues (war, education funding, jobs, women's reproductive rights, environmental concerns...) will directly effect the youth and therefore the future of our nation.

Still, I considered, "What line of reasoning could I possibly present that would encourage the non-voting percentage to get to the polls this election season?"

Being the sports fan that I am, I immediately thought-football. That's right, folks...football.

First of all, 'tis the season! Like millions of Americas, I too have <u>football on the brain</u>. Secondly, I also happen to be a sucker for sports analogies. Now, I know what you might be thinking—how could football possibly be a viable analogy for one of the most critical and fundamental aspects of our democratic process? Democracy is a participatory sport. Without players, there is no game.
